Depp, sporting long hair and an almost visible weight on his shoulders, looks at home in the delapidated farmhouse in Endora, lowa. He gains a new perspective from a worldly and beguling young woman, played by Juliette Lewis, who stops in Endora while her grandmother's travel trailer is stalled for repairs on the outskirts of town.

Lewis, the young actress so memorable in Scorsese's "Cape Fear" and Woody Allen's "Hus-bands and Wives," gives the role

a mystical quality. She inspires Gilbert to live a bit for himself and not just for others.

Stealing scenes from Lewis and a whale-sized actress is no easy task, but Leonardo DiCaprio is ao uninhibited and all over the place that you can't take your eyes off of him. He has copped an Oscar nomination for best supporting actor and, if there's any justice at all in Hollywood, he'll win.

"Gilbert Grape" is the latest from Swedish director Laised Hullstrom, whose hizarely titled "My Life us a Dog" was an equally unusual account of childhood that developed a minor cut: following, Halstrom turns America's heartland into a place that is both bracingly realistic and also decidedly surreal.

Endora, according to the film, is a small town on the brink of commercialization. The locally owned gracery where Gilbert works is constantly threatened by the monster supermarket across the street, where assistant managers hustle through the aisless and a tank full of live lobsters attracts

ment.

Gilbert's best friend, a local lawneare guy, dreams of owning a Burger Barn, which he considers "on the cutting edge of the fast food industry" because it uses Canola oil for the fries. His other buddy, a morticlan's son played by the ever-quirky Crispin Glover, drops less-than-subtle hints about cludely relatives in the hopes of bolstering a sagging family business.

Although it wanders sometimes aimlessly, "Gilbert Grape" is a slice-of-life movie that will probably stick with you a little longer than most. It has an engaging sense of humanity that is at once tragic, life affirming and unforgettable.
