Man shot by wife is on road to recovery

A Farmington Hills business-man, who was shot by his wife while he slept, was expected to be released from the hospital over the weekend, according to a rela-tive.

Lewis Ansara, 41, was removed from intensive care and was taken off a ventilator last week. He's ex-pected to make a full recovery from two gunshot wounds he suf-fered March 3. Following the shooting of her husband, Leila Ansara, 29, dled

after turning the gun on herself. She was suffering from depression since the birth of their fourth child, family members said.
"That's what we understand, but we don't have the whole story yet," said Victor Ansara, a cousin of Lewis Ansara. "We don't have specific records or anything like that. To be quite honest, that's the speculation we've received from what various people have told us.

"We haven't talked too much to Lou about it. We don't want to bother him too much about it

Lewis Ansara, who owns the Red Robin Restaurant in Novi and several Big Boy restaurants, was interviewed by Farmington Hills police Tuesday at Botsford Hospital. Inspector Thomas Godwin said it sounds like depression did have a role in the attempted murder and suicide. Police are no longer investigating. "We've pretty much closed it now," Godwin said. "She did shoot him and took her own life. That's as far as we ga."

Godwin said Leila Ansara was

not believed to have been taking antidepressants, though police have not received a toxicology re-port. Antidepressants are often used in treating postpartum de-

used in treating postpartum de-pression.

The couple's four children, ages 4, 3, 2 and 8 months are staying with relatives, Victor Ansara said. He has visited Lewis Ansara in the hospital.

"Of course, he's down and he's upset about what happened. Right now, his main concern is the kids and him recovering him-self."
