Back in bagel business

Shop reopens after shooting death

Soon after learning that her husband, Corrie Schmidt, had been shot to death during a rob-bery at the family's Southfield Bage! Factory shop, Jo-Ann Schmidt was determined to re-open the business he had worked so hard to build.

so hard to build.

Early last Wednesday morning, just 10 days after the tragedy stuck, she got the shop open and

stuck, she got the anop open and running.

Jo-Ann Schmidt has taken over managing the shop herself. "But I won't be spending 24-hours a day at it like my husband did. I can't do that because I've got three young children at home." The Schmidts have fived in Livonia since 1991.

Shop hours are temporarily limited to 7 a.m. to 3 p.m., she said in an interview Friday. We'll extend the hours later."

All of the employees, including those who were in the shop on March 6 when the fatal robbery occurred, are back at work, Schmidt said. "They're a very loyal crew and things are going well."

Before reopening, Schmidt increased security at the shop,
which is located in a small strip
shopping center on 12 Mile just
west of Telegraph. "I hired a security guard and I installed a
closed-circuit TV and camera.
We'll see everybody who comes in.

"I did it," she continued, "to make the customers and employ-ces feel better. And me, too."

with her since their 37-year-old son-in-law was killed. 'Right now they're helping me at home. My dad will probably go home soon, but my mom will stay for as long as 1 need her. They're holding down the home front. I think they may decide to move here.'

The killing occurred around 6:30 a.m. when two robbers, one armed with a gun, burst Into the popular baged shop. The pall locked the three employees in the back room before killing Schmidt and escaping with an undisclosed amount of money. Schmidt died at the scene from a single gunshot wound.

Because of the outpouring of concern from the business and residential community, the Southfield Chamber of Commerce established a Corrie Schmidt Reward Fund.

Jo-Ann Schmidt said the sup-port she's received since the trag-edy has been "overwhelming. I want to thank everyone for their support, loyalty and caring." Some of the customera coming into the shop talk with Schmidt and extend their sympathy.

One such customer on Friday
was Pam St. Peter of Sterling
Heights. St. Peter was an occasional customer and had seen
Corrie Schmidt in the shop. She
asked Jo-Ann Schmidt if she
"knew him."

When Schmidt replied, "He
was my husband," the customer
began to cry.

St. Peter told Schmidt that she

St. Peter told Schmidt that she had been so upset that she ques-tioned whether or not she should return. "Then I figured, you can't let criminals push you around.

And we must support businesses
like this one."
Police have released a artist's
sketch of the gunman and a
lengthy description. He is described as black man, in his early
20s, about 6-foot-3, with a large
build and a stomach pauch and
a scraggly, thin mustache. His
face is round and his chin is not
prominent. He was wearing a
lack kink skullcap, a welstlength, black leather, casual style
jacket, medium-blue jeana and
high-top white tennie shoes.
Police said the description of
the second robber is sketchy. He
is about the same age and height
as the gunman, but with a meditin build he was wearing a dark
knit skullcap.
