City: Bag plastic for yard waste

Beginning Friday, April 1, plas-tic bags no longer will be accepted for yard waste collection in Farm-fington. Clippings are composed of about 85 percent water, and left on the lawn will quickly decompose and add nutrients to the soil.

Yard waste includes grass clippings, leaves and garden waste. Plastic bags are still ac-cepted for regular rubbish.

Recycling coordinator Ken Bir-kholz said there are several alter-natives to plastic bags when pre-paring yard waste for collection. One of the easiest is to let grass clippings fall back on your lawn.

Or, residents can use a 30-gallon can with a "Yard Waste" label. If you choose this method,

A third alternative is to use a large 30-gallon paper yard waste

bag available at local retail outlets.

Other recycling rules to remember include: Brush and small branches must be bundled and not exceed six inches in diameter, four feet in length, or 60 pounds a bundle. Fall leaf vacuuming will continue.

Plastic bags create problems for compost programs, according to Birkholz. Grass clippings stored in plastic bags create strong odors and the plastic does not decompose in the composting process.
