Anderson granted summary disposition for counts alleging gross negligence by the Farmington School District, the Farmington Board of Education and former superintendent Michael Flanagan.
The count against the district and school board included a re-

The count against the district and school board included a re-

quest for \$10,000 in damages.
Also thrown out were counts alleging breach of contract and that the district violated the Freedom of Information Act.
Dickson's attorney, Jamil Akhtar, believes his client still has a strong case. Added Akhtar, "The eternal optimist, of course."
Akhtar said he was surprised the negligence claim against Michael Flanagan and the violation

of the Freedom of Information Act were, in effect, dropped by the judge. Dickson could not be reached for comment.

The defendants were not surprised by Anderson's decision.

"We didn't believe there was any basis for his claim," Witters said. "We thought the judge would do exactly what he did to-day."

Said Michael Flanagan, who is superintendent for the Wayne County Regional Education Ser-vice Agency: "The bottom line is the judge did the right thing. Jus-tice prevailed. I'm very happy to hear it."
