Hills housing block grant budget bigger, blasted

Although a program designed to help Farmington Hills residents improve their houses with low-in-terest loans or grants has a healthy fund balance, it also has its orders.

its critics. The Farmington Hills City Chouncil narrows approved the proposed 1934-95 Community De-velopment Block Grant Program budget at the regular meeting March 28-43, with councilsom-en Joanne Smith, Cheryl Uliveria and Mayor Larry Lichtman op-posed because the new budget

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would not include code enforce-ment money.

ment money.

City planning director Dale
Counteran said the program,
which the city uses to make capital improvements and enforce
building codes, has a balance of
\$193,285 that it accumulated
from loan repayments over a 12year period.

That money, along with new grant money of \$449,000 and program income for this year estimated at \$60,000, will boost the proposed budget from \$472,000 in 1993-94 to \$702,285.

Countegan explained that the \$193.285 is to be used for housing rehabilitation only. But the new budget originally included an increase of only \$1.285 for housing rehabilitation while tripling the capital improvement housing tribulitation while tripling the capital improvement budget from \$106,500 to \$329,500.

Thus capital projects budgeted include the Linden drainage/paving improvement \$100,000, the Middlebett Road/Eddon out-fall drainage improvements to the Grand River Avenue/Eight Mile Road River Avenue/Eight Mile Road right of way, the Gill road sidewalk of the capital improvements.
