"We'll be near the top and competitive (in the WLAAs)," King said. "It's just a matter of what the other teams have, how they match up against us and how we play them."

### Falcons like outlook

Fourth-year coach Tim Prince would like to see Farmington finish in the top half of the WLAAs standings, and he believes the Falcons have the potential to make the jump.

"I anticipate improving and doing well this year," he said. "In our league, the competition is difficult. Northville and North Farmington have a lot of players, and Canton and Salem have 2,000 students each."

Senior Brett Kourba, who was 10-5 as a singles player, moves into the No. 1 spot on a team with a balance of ability.

"I expect Brett will win 50 percent of his matches, and he's ready for the challenge," Prince said.

"In high school, most play for power, and he plays for consistency and has done well that way. In a match where someone is overhitting, he could win because of his consistent play."

The other singles players will come from a group that includes seniors Kevin Cook and John Shea and juniors Scott Brown and Scott McKay.

"In the first few matches, we'll figure out who plays best in game situations to determine who plays," Prince said. McKay played No. 3 singles last year and Shea No. 4. Cook was overseas last year. Down wasn't a varsity player but has improved his game, according to Prince.

The Falcons should be solid at No. 1 doubles where seniors Adam Berstrom and Steve McDonald return for the third consecutive year.

"They have a tremendous amount of potential to do well in the league," Prince said. "A lot of other teams' No. 1 doubles moved on, and they're still here."

Freshman Wade Clark will play No. 2 doubles with one of the four who doesn't play singles. Freshmen Andy Pjeter and Scott McKay comprise the No. 3 team, sophomore Jake Livermore and Kevin Davis, the No. 4 duo.

"They're young but good players," Prince said. "Livermore and Davis were 500 (at two doubles) and they're moving down to four, so we've got more talent coming in."

Clark has really nice strokes, and I think he'll be an excellent player in the future.

Clark exchanges student Phillip Brandt also could figure in the doubles picture for the Falcons, who were 4-6-1 in league duals and 7-7-1 overall. Farmington begins the season Tuesday when it plays host to West Bloomfield.

### Gutman leads Harrison

The Hawks, who return 10 players from a team that includes seniors Kevin Cook and John Shea and juniors Scott Brown and Scott McKay.

"He has improved and gotten a lot stronger," coach Bernia Goldstein said. "He should win a few more and I'd like to see him finish around 500. He was young and wasn't ready (for that role) last season, and he's better this year."

Junior Jon Stern makes the jump from second doubles to No. 2 singles, and senior Darin Gilyvdy was bumped up from No. 4 to the singles.

"(Stern) is hitting the ball well and covering the court a lot better," Goldstein said, adding Stern has a good net game.

"(Gilyvdy) hits nice, hard shots. He doesn't just push the ball back. He hits it back but keeps the ball in play enough the opponent goes crazy."

The No. 4 singles player will be senior Charles Bamberg, who was at one double last year. He's a good all-round athlete, according to Goldstein, with experience in football and basketball.

"He has improved a lot," Goldstein said. "He could have one of the better records on the team, because he's playing four singles and he's a decent player."

The Hawks must find a partner for Junior Howe Kays, who returns at No. 1 doubles. Goldstein has plenty of prospects including Juniors Sam Pritch and Brian Atkinson, sophomores Jim McLean and freshman Sean Sarafin, Chris Leland and Rudi Kupfer.

"It's going to take two to three weeks of matches before we can get four doubles teams," Goldstein said. "Once they get used to each other, I think we'll be respectable."






