

POLICE/FIRE CALLS

Listed below are some of the Farmington area police incidents, fire calls and court cases reported during the past week.

DRUGS
Farmington Hills police arrested a Redford youth, 17, for possession of marijuana at 1 a.m. April 23 on Colwell in Farmington Hills. The youth and his friend, 16, of Farmington Hills acted suspicious when police asked them where they were going. A pat-down search found two sealed bags (one gram each) of marijuana and a beeper.

THEFT
A total of 102 pagers worth \$3,000 were stolen from Ameritech Mobile on Northwestern Highway in Farmington Hills April 12-21.
A blue minibus (\$300) was stolen from the back yard of a residence on Leestock in Farmington Hills April 3-16.
A \$350 Audiovox cellular phone was stolen from an unlocked Subaru parked at the Taco Bell on Orchard Lane in Farmington Hills April 26.

VANDALISM
A gray 1993 Honda parked at the Mercy Center on 11 Mile in Farmington Hills was "keyed" April 26, causing \$500 in damage to each. Windows in a red 1994 Olds Cutlass Supreme parked on Bunker Hill in Farmington Hills were broken (\$1,000) April 26.
The tall lights, right mirror and right front turning light were broken (\$280) on a white Ford Granada parked at Randazzo's on Middlebelt in Farmington Hills April 27.
A car ran over 100 feet of lawn and sod and knocked over the wooden post for a mailbox (\$300-\$400) at a residence on Wood Farm in Farmington Hills April 27.

Eight vehicles were vandalized at the Independence Green Apartments on Madison in Farmington Hills April 28. The rear windows were shattered using a BB gun and causing \$300 in damage to each. The vehicles were: a blue 1986 Buick Century, a gray 1981 Lincoln Continental, a blue 1993 Ford Festiva, a blue 1990 Chevrolet Cavalier, a black 1972 Mercedes Benz, a Teal 1994 Saturn, a brown 1993 Chrysler Conquest and a red 1993 Geo Metro.

A BB gun was also used to shoot out the windshield of a green 1992 Ford F-250 pickup at DIA Tool on Research in Farmington Hills April 27-28 (\$300).
The rear windows of a blue 1989 Ford Aestar and a tan 1988 Chevy 1500 pickup were also shot out with a BB gun April 28 on Ontaga in Farmington Hills causing \$200 in damage to each.
The driver's side window was broken on a 1986 Chevy Camaro

parked on Lilac in Farmington April 29, causing \$150 in damage.
The rear left window was shot out with a BB gun on a 1987 Ford parked on Power in Farmington April 28, causing \$200 in damage.
The driver's side window was broken on a 1975 Olds parked on Valley View in Farmington April 28, causing \$200 in damage.
A BB or pellet gun was used to shoot a driver's side window on a GMC Sonoma parked on Power and Nine Mile in Farmington April 28, causing \$80 in damage.
A BB or pellet shattered a rear window on a 1994 Chevrolet Lumina parked on Valley View in Farmington April 28, causing \$300 in damage.
The rear window was broken on a 1987 Dodge Sundance parked on Lakeway and Power in Farmington April 28, causing \$120 in damage.

AUTO THEFT
A red 1994 Mazda 323 worth \$12,000 was rented from Enterprise Rental on Drake and not returned April 13.

ASSAULT
Farmington Hills police are investigating a fight between two eighth-graders at Power Middle School on Rhonwood in Farmington Hills April 27. Witnesses said the fight started after the two boys, both 14, were throwing a football. The football hit one boy when he wasn't looking and the

two began to fight. The victim was kicked in the head and legs, according to witnesses and was taken by ambulance to Botaford General Hospital where he was treated and released.
BREAK-INS
A kitchen door wall at a residence on Knighton in Farmington Hills was pried open causing \$200 in damage April 27, but nothing was taken. A family dog may have scared away the would-be thief.
A driver's side window was smashed and a pair of sunglasses (\$85) were stolen from a 1992 Volkswagen parked on Prospect in Farmington April 28, causing \$200 in damage.

FIRES
Firefighters from Station 1 went to the Independence Green Apartments on Madison in Farmington Hills at 5:12 p.m. April 27 and found that a small amount of paper in the basement had self-extinguished with no damage. The fire is under investigation.
Light smoke was also discovered at condos on 12 Mile in Farmington Hills by firefighters from Station 4 at 1 p.m. April 28. A pot on a stove with charred food had been the cause.

Farmington Hills firefighters from Station 3 put out a kitchen fire at the Elks Club on Orchard Lake at 7:02 p.m. April 19. Material with the consistency of fiberboard had caught fire on top of the ovens. Property damage was

\$4,000 and damage to contents was \$2,000.
Farmington Hills firefighters from Station 4 smothered a bird's nest that had caught fire from an outside light at a residence on Orchard Lake at 6:37 p.m. April 22. There was no property damage.
Firefighters believe a discarded cigarette started a fire between the siding and basement ceiling joist at the Gateway Apartments on Gateway in Farmington Hills April 24. Firefighters from Station 2 investigated the fire, which had been extinguished with dry chemicals by residents. Damage to the building is estimated at \$1,000.
Farmington Hills firefighters from Station 1 disconnected the fuse box at the Fairmont Apartments in Farmington Hills at 10:21 p.m. April 24 to stop electrical arcing behind the fuse box.
Firefighters from Station 1 in Farmington Hills investigated a sprinkler system that had been damaged by a forklift at Autotek on Research in Farmington Hills at 3:49 p.m. April 18.

A resident living on Power Road in Farmington Hills reported an electric shock from her water bed to Farmington Hills Station 2 at 11:30 a.m. April 7. The heating unit had overheated, melting the mattress and putting the woman's feet under water. Damage is estimated at \$5,000 to the property and \$2,500 to contents.
