No one nowadays would every rell "Give us back "The Mikadel" like the audiences did back in the Victorian Aye after viewing Gilbert and Sullivan's comic operetts "Ruddigure or The Pires". But they would undubtedly leave it out of the duo's greatest hits list, which includes that Japanese operetts, "H.M.S. Pinofore." and "The Pirates of Penzance."
If those audiences dug a little deeper, they would appreciate the burlesque-like commedy that makes "Ruddigure" into a clever little mockey of facades in the 19th century that's just as appropriate today.

After a slightly flat and passionate overture by an orchestra conducted by Joseph Gamache, the curtain opens and the St. Bede Players production launches into the first libretto, "Fair is
