# 35 years of success for jeweler

After 35 years in the jewelry design and manufacturing business, you'd think he'd seen it all.

But Austrian-born Erwin Pearl (what a great name for a jeweler) is still excited about new collections and still coming up with unique inspirations.



He talked about The Wrought Iron

"Nature remains a great source of ideas for a keen observer," he said. "The flowers, trees, wildlife — all can be interpreted beautifully in jewlly and that's what I've always tried to do. The same for architecture. Noticing the iron gates that surround cities in Austria, it dawned on me that they would make great jewelly if I could find a way to interpret them."

Presiding over a \$30-million international jewely business with a staff of 400, finds Pearl globe hopping frequently to visit retailers and factories from Czechoslovakia to Paris.
