The highly-favored Knighta simply ran away with their first regional champlonship, shooting a round of 374 and winning by 26 strokes over runner-up Farmington Hills Mercy, which shot 400.

But nearly every other important result in the 15-team, five player-count-four regional tournament was determined by a tie-breaker. The top three teams and top five individuals qualified for the two-day state meet set for June 3-4 at the Forest Akers Golf Course in East Lansing.

Troy and West Bloomfield tied for

third with acores of 409. The Colts, however, earned the final qualifying berth based on a better score registered by its fifth golfer. Individually, Athens' Stacey Smith and Labser's Marry Glenn captured low-scoring honors with rounds of 91. Smith was awarded first place on a tie-breaker (best hole-by-hole score starting backwards from the 18th hole).

West Bloomfield's Leah Trahey and Lahser's Nikki Ruddy died for third at 92 (Trahey was awarded third place) and Rochestor's Katie Collins and Lahser's Wendy Wierzbicki died for fifth Collins received the fifth-place modal on the tie-breaker and earmed the final individual qualifying borths.

Lahser coach Bob Kefgen, whose team now has qualified for state three of the past five years, was relieved
