## Young leads CMU into NCAA tourney



It's the seventh inning and Central Michigan is down a run in a baseball game with Miami University. Kevin Young, who starred at Farmington High four years ago, hits a two-run homer and

Kevin Young is having a fabulous season — the kind most players can only dream about — playing baseball for Central Michigan University.

But for all the personal glory he has reaped, the former Farmington High star is most proud of what his efforts have done to help the team.

The underlog Chippewas (38-19) toppled first-place Kent State to win the Mid-American Conference tournament last weekend and begin play today in the NCAA regional at Tallehassee, Fis.

"I think I had some-thing to do with that, and that's where most of my gratification comes from," Young said. "We're a winning team and not just a good team with a bunch of good players."
The junior third baseman from Northville had a lot to do with CMU's

Success.

Young won the MAC triple crown, leading the conference with a .417 average, 15 home runs and 56 runs batted in Stata like that carned Young the MAC Player of the Year Award.

His current numbers are 411, 16
and 59 after he was 4-for-12 with
three RBI in the MAC tournament.
Young had three hits, including a
two-run homer, in the final to help
the Chippewas beat Kent 5-4 in 11
innings.

"If somebody had told me I'd have 16 home runs right now, I would have laughed." Young said, adding he changed his stance and closed it up.
"My dad noticed I wean't keeping my hands and weight back enough. That's the key to driving the hall. I was taking good swings, but I wasn't powering the hall." Young attributes his outstanding season to a position change. While that might disrupt most players, it had the opposite effect on Young. Hie was an All-Observer center fielder as a senior at Farmington in 1990 and, after being redshirted at CMU, played right field the past two seasons and first five games this year. Then he was moved to third base, a position he hadn't played since his junior year in high school.
"I think that had a lot to do with my hitting," he said." I really concentrated on playing well (in the field) and forget about the pressures of hitting.

"It took my mind off thoughts of over swinging and things like that. I just worried about fielding. There was no pressure on me; it was like I was expected to make mistakes. I attrib-ute my hitting to that and working ute my hitting to that and working hard."

Young also got a boost of confidence by playing in a wooden-bat league last summer in Cincinnati.
"It makes you a better hitter," he said. "If you make a mistake with a
