CITY OF FARMINGTON NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING ON INCREASING PROPERTY TAXES AND TO REVIEW 1994-95 PROPOSED BUDGET

The City Council of the City of Farmington will hold a public hearing at 8:00 p.m. on Monday, June 6, 1994, in the Council Chambers in City Hall, 23800 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan 48335, on a proposed increase of .3055 mills in the 1994 operating and limited debt service tax levy and on the proposed 1994-95 budget. The date and location of the meeting to take action on the proposed additional millage will be announced at this public meeting.

In the previous year the city levied 10.5603 mills (\$10.5603 per \$1,000 of State Equalized Valuation, SEV) for city operation and Charter limited debt service and an additional 3.1097 mills (\$3.1097 per \$1,000 SEV) was levied for city unlimited debt service for a total millage rate of 13.6700 mills (13.6700 for \$1,000 SEV). State law, Act 5 of 1982) provides that the base tax rate for 1994 city operating taxes be reduced from 10.5603 mills (\$10.5603 per \$1,000 SEV) to 10.4948 mills (\$10.4948 per \$1,000 SEV). This is a .0655 mill (\$.0655 per \$1,000 SEV) lower tax rate than the 1993 operating tax rate.

The recommended budget will increase the cost of delivering city services this year. The cost of employee salaries and fringe benefits, and general inflationary increases in goods and services purchased by the city, and financing the library and court system will increase the General Fund operating expenditures in Fiscal Year 1994-95. Revenues from other sources will not be adequate to offset the increased cost of providing services.

The increase in the cost of providing essential services will make it necessary to increase the millage rate for 1994. The maximum total proposed millage rate will be 13.91 mills (\$13.91 per \$1,000 SEV). This millage rate provides a 2.2456% increase in city operating and debt service property tax revenues. If the proposed additional millage rate is not approved, the operating and limited debt service revenue will increase by .2665% over the preceding year's operating and limited debt service revenue. Individual property taxes may increase greater or less than the estimated average.

The City of Farmington has complete authority to establish the number of mills to be levied from within its authorized millage rate.

Public comments, oral or written, are welcome at the hearing on the proposed millage rate and on the proposed budget for FY 1994-95.

TO ALL INTERESTED AGENCIES, GROUPS, AND PERSONS:
On or about June 3, 1994, the above named City of Farmington Hills, Oakland County, will request the U.S. Department of Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 (PL 93-383) for the following project:
Housing Rehabilitation Program to Improve Existing Single-Family Housing in Farmington Hills, Oakland County, Michigan (317,753.00)
An Environmental Review Record respecting this project, has been made by the above named Farmington Hills, Oakland County, which documents the environmental review of the project. This Environmental Review Record is on file at the above address and is available for public examination and copying upon request.
The City of Farmington Hills will undertake the project described above with Block Grant Funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. Farmington Hills is certifying to HUD that Farmington Hills and William A. Costick, in his official capacity as City Manager, consent to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal Courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to environmental review, decision making, and action; and that these responsibilities have been satisfied. The legal effect of the certification is that upon its approval, Farmington Hills may use the Block Grant funds, and HUD will have satisfied its responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969. HUD will accept an objection to its approval of the release of funds and acceptance of the certification only if it is one of the following bases: (a) the certification was not in fact executed by the chief executive officer or other officer of applicant approved by HUD; or (b) that applicant's environmental review record for the project indicates omission of a required decision, finding, or step applicable to the project in the environmental review process. Objections must be prepared and submitted in accordance with the required procedure (24 CFR, Part 58) and may be addressed to HUD, P.V. McNamara Federal Bldg., 477 Michigan Avenue, Detroit, Michigan 48226.
Objections to the release of funds on basis other than those stated above will not be considered by HUD. No objection received after June 28, 1994 will be considered by HUD.
