

# Politicos to rally at Heritage Park

# Farmington still holding line on outdoor water use

Like most cities served by the Detroit Water & Sewerage Department, the city of Farmington has instituted restrictions on outdoor water use.

Residents with odd-number addresses will be allowed to water

lawns and engage in other outdoor water uses on odd-numbered days and even-numbered addresses will be allowed exterior water use on even-numbered days.

Violators are subject to a \$500 fine.

councilwoman Joanne Smith and councilman Jon Grant, supported the plan, said the city couldn't fend off development on the land indefinitely.

"Reality is: There is going to be development on that corner," Bates said. "I think a lot of us wish as soon as we got here we could have locked the door."

Bates also said that the city could wind up in court in a no-

win situation if it tried to put a halt on development. Smith praised changes from the original plan that reduced density and protected many of the trees

and other natural features of the property.

Jonna's proposal protects much of the area's natural beauty as the eastern gateway to the city, Grant said.

The project would provide additional drainage for the area, road improvements, help for the Detroit Edison 120KV line being build along the I-696 route, public sidewalks, woodland preservation,

a sound buffer, an emergency road to I-696, and single-family homes that would bolster property values in the surrounding area, Jonna said.

"You can't do it all," he said of complaints that the development did not preserve enough open space and have large enough lots. "(Retail) competition can only strengthen the area."

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
