It's the development of Nigea Carter and Napolean Outlaw at wide receiver. They combined to catch 35 balls last season; if opponents plans to double-team Coleman are to be thwarted, they'll have to increase their production.

But again, none of this is worth worrying about to Coleman. "We'll deal with it game-bygame," he replied when asked how he handled the spectre of constant double-teaming.

He knows how close the Spartans are to a Rose Bowl borth, however, "We've just got to make a few more big plays, get a few breaks," he said.

The elements are there. Sorting them out and getting them to produce will be the key to MSU's campaign.
