Walled Lake voters go to school on Project 21

The Saint Saint Coffee's flowing in the Walled Lake Consolidated School District — and so is information about "Project 21," the 316 million bond issue to be decided by other Tuesday, Sept. 27.

Beginning Thursday, a series of 19 public information meetings at individual schools will begin with seasons at Twin Beach and Pleasant Lake elementaries (set for 7 and 7-40 pm., respectively). Augmenting those meetings will be a myriad of coffee Matches at homes, all designed with one thing in mind.

According to school board president David Flammer, the sessions are designed to better inform residents and taxpayers about why a successful vote is essential to the rapidly growing district's future.

"There will be a videotape (shown) that introduces the concept and reviews for everyone what will be included in the bond issue," said Flammer about the school meetings and leas-formal coffees, all organized by The Citizens for Walled Lake Schools. "And from there on it will be pretty much a question-and-answertype session."

The video also was shown at the Sept. 1 board meeting during a "Project 21" status report, Flammer said.

He explained that at each of the school meetings one district administrator and one school board member will be on hand to answer questions about the second major bond issue in two years.

To that end, a special six-page edition of the district's Learning newsletter was mailed out to all homes, including a listing of vot-ing negligible.

"There always were people who said they didn't find out about the bond issue (in '93) even though there were mailings, individual notification, a video was shown on cable. And so we're following the same route again.

But we're trying to make a little more of an effort to make sure people find out about it," he said. Flammer added that district of-ficials remain "very open and willing to talk to people" about the bond issue. "I don't know what more can be done in that area."

And those officials are cau-tiously optimistic that there will be a different ending when all the votes are tallied.

"We're still real optimistic,"
Flammer said, "We're glad (state school) financing has settled for now, People see what's happening and they see what's happening in

the district. The need for new facilities and technology."

Major components of "Project 21" include: a \$10 million elementary school, to be built near 13 Mile-Meadowbrook roads in Novi; two new middle schools, costing a combinet \$39 million, at Charms-Wiyam roads and a tobe-determined site; a \$42 million "renewal" of Walled Lake Central High School; improvements to existing schools and enhanced technology.
