

Raiders, Hawks on early-season tear

North Farmington used a good fourth quarter and big free-throw advantage to defeat host Southfield 50-34 in girls basketball Thursday.

The Raiders (3-0) had only a 38-30 lead after three periods but outscored the Blue Jays 12-4 in the fourth.

North, taking advantage of Southfield's aggressive play and resulting fouls, made 10 of 42 free throws and the Blue Jays two of 10.

Senior Aliasha Gordon continued her excellent scoring pace with 21 points and also led the Raiders with 10 rebounds.

Kathie Collins added eight points, Carrie May (seven steals) and Kelly Fournier seven each.

"They were trying to play aggressively and take Aliasha out of the game," North coach Lance Davis said. "Our girls weren't panicking, and we were attacking offensively."

"Unfortunately, we didn't make free throws the way we should have, or the game would have been decided earlier."

The Raiders played tentatively early in the game and didn't create scoring situations with their defense, according to Davis.

North led 24-19 at halftime.

"We put ourselves in a position to lose a game we should win easily," he said. "The girls realized the urgency of the moment."

BASKETBALL

"In the fourth quarter, we stepped it up defensively, switching from a zone to a man-to-man, and forced them into some bad shots and got some transition baskets."

"We were always in command. We just didn't put them away the way we should have."

Nikki Quick scored 15 points to lead Southfield (1-2).

North's unbeaten start is no surprise to Davis.

"That's something we expected, so I have to give the team credit for achieving that," he said. "The girls are searching for respect. They want to be known as a good team."

HARRISON 64, NOV 35: Farmington Hills Harrison also improved to 3-0 Friday with its rout of visiting Novi.

Trailing 9-7 entering the second quarter, the Hawks exploded on a 23-10 run. The rout continued in the third quarter as Harrison outscored the Wildcats 21-8.

Senior forward Krista Snow paced the Harrison attack with 15 points. Erika Greene and Kelly LaCourse added 13 and 11 points, respectively. The Hawks also received nine points each from Erika LaCourse and Jenny Myrland.

Harrison converted 15 of 17 at the free throw line and made five of 10 from three-point range.

"We shot the ball well all night, especially from the perimeter," Harrison

coach Pete Mantyla said. "We also got some easy baskets off good defensive pressure."

"I'm really happy with our depth right now. We're getting a lot of solid performance from a lot of different people. Christine Edwards led Novi with 14 points."

On Thursday, the Hawks recorded their highest offensive point total of the last decade with a 58-50 victory over host Redford Union.

"We had a lot of offensive highlights but not many defensive ones," Mantyla said.

Harrison made a lot of free throws and demonstrated its team depth in the process after getting in early trouble.

The Hawks sank 27 of 36 free throws and the Panthers 13 of 27.

Greene, a junior center, scored a career-high 22 points and grabbed 11 rebounds to lead Harrison in both areas.

Seniors guards Kelly and Erika LaCourse scored 14 and 13 points, respectively. Kelly also had nine rebounds and seven steals.

Snow and junior forward Ami Patel combined nine points each, and sophomore guard Monique Anderson added eight points and seven assists.

Senior guard Jenny Markham matched Greene's point total for RU (11). Sue Crowley tossed in 11 points and Lauren Wright 10.

The Hawks led 23-11 after one quarter, 46-33 at halftime and 70-47 at the end of three periods.

MERCY 80, JEFFERSON 33: Farmington Hills Mercy outscored visiting Monroe Jefferson 30-9 in the second quarter Friday, converting 15 of 17 at the free throw line and made five of 10 from three-point range.

"We shot the ball well all night, especially from the perimeter," Harrison

said. "It was nice to finally break loose and score some points."

Junior guard Chris Dietrich led the Bears (2-2) with 24 points, which included four triples.

Angell played her best game of the young season Thursday in Mercy's 58-50 defeat of visiting South Lyon.

The senior center scored 15 points, reaching double figures for the first time, and also had eight rebounds and seven steals. Lee added 10 points, Schwinge nine and Valade eight.

The Marlins led 30-20 at halftime and held the Lions to single-digit scoring in each quarter of the second half.

"We fouled the daylight out of them in the first half," Bales said, adding the Marlins had four players with two fouls.

The Falcons (2-2) were led by Klay Weidman's 21 points. Andre Galay added 15 and Amanda Porter eight.

"We're improving with each game we play," Farmington coach John Verdura said. "Our girls got us some easy points in the first quarter, and we showed more poise on offense throughout the game."

Natacha Edwards paced West Bloomfield (3-3) with 11 points.

ST. AGATHA 58, CYTILE 12: The Aggies won their first game of the season Thursday in convincing fashion over visiting Livonia Cytile.

The Aggies, who were winless in the season-opening Redford Union Tournament, are 1-2 overall.

Senior guard Susan Baxter led St. Agatha with 17 points and senior forward Kelly Vandermarsh added 12.

Freshman guard Katie Miller played a good all-around game, according to coach Jim Kearly.
