#### Warriors capture title


he Lutheran High Westland girls cross country team, paced by second-place fin-taher Jodi Werman, recently captured the championship at the Whitmore Lake Invita-

# Hawks blitz Wildcats in rematch



Farmington Hills Harrison finished the regular season with its eighth straight football victory Friday, rolling over unbeaten Oxford by the surprisingly one-sided score of 42-0.

The rematch was somewhat like the first Farmington Hills Harrison. Oxford football game.
