Man bound over in escape try



An attempted escape from Farmington Hills po-lice could buy a man 20 years or more in jail. The June 8 incident led Hills police to tighten security during prisoner transport.

A Brighton man accused of trying to wrestle a pistol from a Farmington Hills police officer in a failed escape attempt now faces a Circuit Court tri-al.

Gregory Krachenfels, 36, pleaded not guilty to assault with intent to

commit murder in 47th District Court Nov. 30.

Judge Fred Harris bound Krachen-fels over to Oakland County Circuit Cout, where he is scheduled to be ar-raigned on the charge before Judge Eugene Schnels at 8:30 a.m. Thurs-day, Dec. 15. If convicted, Krachen-

fels could face a 20-year-to-life prison term.

That charge was filed by the Oak-land County Prosecutor's Office after testimony by Farmington Hills detective Dave Lee at Krachendis' preliminary examination on two other charges: attempting to take a firearm from a police officer, a five-year felony, and attempting to exape, a four-year felony. The defendant still faces those count as well.

All three charges stem from a June 8 incident.

8 incident. Krachenfels had been bound over

to Circuit Court on an armed robbery charge and was being transported by Loe from 47th District Court to the Hills police station, to be taken back to the county jail.

The prisoner, who was in the front

The prisoner, who was in the front seat next to Loe, is accused of pushing the detective into the door while the car was driving north on Power Road, causing the car to swerve across the road and onto the west shoulder.

Witnesses, who called police, saw
