open and function, it would revert to the city."

Income from classes, events, room rentals, fund drives and vol-unteer functions like Second Edi-tion, maintain the historic building and grounds.

Farmington Hills resident Nan Held, a founding Second Edition volunteer, recalled spending the first summer helping to organize everything before opening in the fall of 1980. It was a gradual success story.

"A lot of word-of-mouth and a little advertising and then it fi-nally started to grow," Held said. "We still have people that come in and say, 'I didn't know this was here."

The business began to really The business began to reasy take off shout five years ago, and the little shop moved into more specious quarters in the house. It now has own entry into the building on the east side facing Parmington Road.

"Most people generally prefer consignment and have the fun of watching some money come in," said Pat Thompson of Farmington Hills, also one of the founding rolunteers. 
