wide. ■ PART TWO: (\$25.45 million) Renovation of older school build-ings to bring them up to estab-lished baseline standards; conlished baseline standards; constructing and equipping of an auxiliary gym at Walled Lake Western and a competition gymnasium at Walled Lake Central; constructing and equipping of a performing arts center at Central; and coupping of a handicapped-accessible swimning pool at Central; and sits development and improvement.
