One Foot in the Blues - ZZ Top



ZZ Top has committed that all-too-common crime against the record-buying public by re-releasing songs on a compilation instead of creating something new. On "One Foot in the Blues" (Warner Bres.), ZZ Top has compiled 17 songs from their history, some as serily as 1972, which show their interpretation of the blues. The drawbock of the album is that the only hit (and a minor one at that) is "My Head's in Missispit" from their "Racycler" album. The big hits were compiled a few years ago as a greatest hits packags.

blues. ZZ Top never strayed far from their roots and

ZZ Top wrote all the some on the abum instead of
covering a bunch of Willie Dixon songs.

If you want a complication of ZZ Top songs, you should buy one of their greatest hits albums (they have two) or just buy a couple of albums and hear some of the songs from "One Foot in the Blues" as well as the big hits.

The Specialty Story – various artists

Just as surely as Sun and Chess had a part in it, Art Rupe's Los Angeles-based Specialty Records was instrumental in the mid-wifery of rock 'n roll. As this superb five-CD boxed set illustrates, they also flirted successfully with gospel (The Soul Stirrers, with both Sam Cooke and Johnnie Teylor on lead vocals, and the Chosen Gospel Singers, with a young Lou Rawis out front, are both represented here) and blues (John Lee Hooker, Roosevelt Sykes, Big Macco, Guitar Sim, Floyd Dizon, Earl King, H-Bomb Ferguson and Perry Mayfeld), but it is as a seminal jump blues, R&B and nascent rock 'n'roll label that they will always be known.

From its mid-'40s beginnings, Specialty nearly had a lock on the jitterbug crass. Although they didn't have the main man, Louis Jordan, under contract, they had the second, third and fourth (at Itsatimets popular pur-yors of the box and boogle frest-inty, Roy Milton, according to compiler filly bern, had 19 top 10 R&B hits between 1945 and 1953. They're all here, from the sexy "Early in the Morning" to the classic "The Huckibouck." Milton's secret wespon, planist/vocalist Camille Howard, also checks in with a quartet of aingles.

Jimmy Ligins and his Drops of Joy, whose 1947 "Cadillac Boogle" pre-dates the lite Turner and Jackie Brenstein "Rocket 88" (frequently referred to as rock 'n'roll's first hit), gives credence to the theory that rock 'n'roll came rearing out of the 1940s.

label solvent for years. Nineteen of his best, including "Senny Jenny," "Good Golly Miss Molly,"
"Long Tall Sally," "Lucille" and, naturally, "Jutil
"Fruttil," are included here.

There's so much moce. Within these five discs and
130 singles (covering 1944-1964) are better than six
glorious hours in which reside some of the most durable and still resonant R&H and rock 'n'roll songs
of the era. This is the birth of the genre, and as vital
a collection of real "roots" as I've ever heard collectact.
