20-year-old guilty of murder

Brian A. Harr, just 20 years of ago, is headed to prison for the rest of his life for the brutal mur-der of Debra Lynn Goniwichs of The Company of

reat of his life for the brutal murder of Debra Lynn Gonlwichs of
Redford Township.

He was sentenced Monday to
mandatory life in prison by Detroit Recorder's Court Judge
Prentis Edwards, who presided
over Harr's jury trial last month
when he was found guilty of firstdegree murder.

In a brief statement after sentencing, Harr showed remorse for
the "hooting by spologizing to
family members in the court for
gunning down Goniwicha, 21, inside a Little Caesar's pixzeris in a
small shopping mall at Inkster
and Plymouth roads in southwest
Redford.

"He kind of spologized to us
and it surprised me because it
was the only time he showed any
remorso" said Ronald Goniwicha,
the victim's father.

Edwards' sentence for Harr
means he won't ever become eligible for parole.

"He has nothing to look for-

means he won't ever become eighble for perole.

"He has nothing to look forward to, but that doesn't make me any happier because we don't have anything to look forward to either, daughter-wise," Goniwicha

said Tuesday. Edwards sentenced. Herr to prison terms of three to 15 years and one to five years for breaking into a Reddord spart-ment of a friend, where he stole the gun he used to shoot Goniwicha last April 15.

He also admitted to Redford police that he fatally shot Gonlwichs, a Redford Union High graduate, who was working as a manager trainee in charge of the late shift at the pixeria the night of the abottom.

A jury found Harr guilty of first degree murder as charged despite the argument of his his court-appointed attorney, Mary Banks, that he is a troubled, suicidal man, who intended only to shoot bimself.

Banks had argued that Harr's memory of the facts leading up to the shooting is wague and he suffered an alcoholic blackout at the time he opened fired on Goniwicha.

She called the shooting an acci-

Goniwicha. She called the shooting an accidental tragedy and elicited testimony in an attempt to show that Harr had no intent to kill ber. "He only intended to kill himself. He had no motive to kill her. He never worked there and never knew Debra."
