### Kozicki assists OU victory

**K**arl Kozicki of Farmington Hills contributed to Oakland University's second consecutive NCAA Division II men's swim title. The Pioneers concluded the four-day meet Saturday in Canton (Ohio) with a school record 890 points, 317 ahead of California State-Bakersfield. Kozicki, a freshman from North Farmington High School, was 10th in the 500 freestyle (4:37.06), 14th in the 400 IM (4:37.14) and 11th in the 1,500 freestyle (16:08.89). The OU women finished second, ending their string of five straight national titles. Air Force Academy scored 690 points, the Pioneers 663. OU freshman and North Farmington graduate Mandy Terrell placed third in one-meter diving with 339.45 points.

**T**he site of the Michigan High School Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame banquet Saturday has been moved from Crisler Arena to the University of Michigan track and tennis building. Horwitz has coached football for 29 years (1966-94) at East Middle School, Birmingham Groves, Harrison High and North.

### Fury finishes 2nd again

**T**he Farmington Fury, an under-16 boys premier soccer team, was second in its indoor division for the second time this year. The Fury (11-5) was 6-2 behind two-time champion Ann Arbor Arsenal, which defeated Farmington 5-4 again. The Fury scored 78 goals and allowed 26 in division play. "I'm not at all disappointed with our season," Fury coach Tom Faro said. "Sure, it would have been nice to beat (Ann Arbor). This is good for the guys; it gives them incentive to work harder."

## Michalski sees silver lining in loss

**Farmington High wrestler Matt Michalski fell one victory shy of winning a coveted state championship. But the good news is he gets another chance next year.**

Matt Michalski chose to see the positive side despite having suffered his most disappointing defeat as a high school wrestler.

The Farmington junior placed second in the Class A tournament, losing 6-2 to Holland West Ottawa sophomore Karl Nadolsky in the 100-pound final Saturday.

"There's a lot of pressure if you're a returning state champ," Michalski said. "In a way, it's kind of good that I didn't (win). That's another step I can reach for."

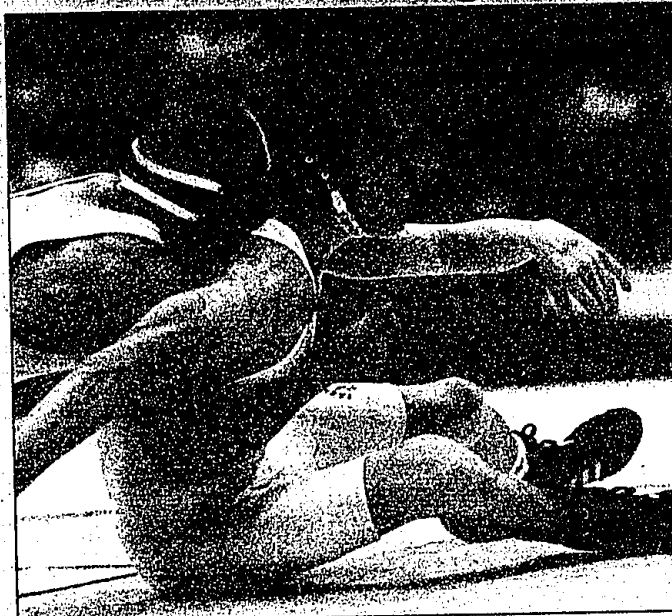
"I know I haven't accomplished everything, and that's something to drive me for next year," Michalski, who improved upon his fifth-place finish last year, and ended with a 42-3 record and won Observerland, Western Lakes and regional championships.

"I'm disappointed in the sense I know I was that close," he said. "I can't complain about the season. I accomplished all the goals I set. I wanted to place higher than last year, which I did."

In the championship bout, the score was tied 2-2 after two periods. Michalski had two escape points and Nadolsky a takedown.

## It's no contest this time as Warriors coast to title

**Rice was a nervous Ron Richards who watched Birmingham Brother Rice capture the Class A boys swim championship last year.**

Well, Richards was a relaxed coach this year as his Warriors easily defended their crown. Rice was ahead by more than 100 points after the preliminary rounds Friday and only had to show up for the championship round Saturday in the 71st annual meet hosted by Michigan State University.

Brother Rice finished with 221 points while runner-up Ann Arbor Pioneer scored 113 points. Grand Haven took third (106) and Birmingham Groves fourth (79.4). Troy was eighth (48), Rochester Adams and Bloomfield Hills Lebar tied for 30th (10), West Bloomfield placed 35th (7.4) and Walled Lake Western finished

tied for 42nd (two points). Neither North Farmington or Farmington scored. But the championship belonged to Brother Rice, which was ranked No. 1 all year and lived up to the billing in grand style.

"This year was a completely different feeling. On Saturday, I didn't feel near the pressure that I felt last year," said Richards. "Last year we were 12 points down heading into Saturday. This year we were ahead by 100 points. They went for their times on Friday and really competed on Saturday," he said. "We could have gone in on Saturday and not competed, but they were able to stay focused and go in with a winning attitude when they got up to the blocks."

Rice won with its superior depth and outstanding relay strength. The Warriors won all three relays, had an individual winner in Matt Parrish and registered eight top-six finishes.

Parrish took the backstroke in 52.66 in what Richards called a "small surprise."

The winning relay combinations included Swintek, Nick Duda, Parrish and Rizzert (medley); Karl Pawlewicz, Rizzert, Swintek and Mario Scussel (200 freestyle); and Pawlowicz, Dennis Moore, Parrish and Scussel (400 freestyle).

Redford Catholic Central's Paul Magoulic placed sixth in the 50 freestyle (22.01) and 11th in the 100 freestyle (48.46).

The Shamrocks tied with Jenison and Portage Northern for 27th place with 11 points each.
