

Mt. Carmel Sets Free Blood Tests

Free blood-screening tests will be available next-round beginning Nov. 5 on the sixth floor of the Lourdes Building of Mt. Carmel Mercy Hospital, 6131 W. Outer Dr.

Sponsored by the Michigan Diabetes Association, the tests will be available from 1 to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday. All persons are eligible for testing although persons under 21 must be accompanied by a parent. A rich meal should be eaten before the testing.

Since diabetes can best be controlled when detected early, the program's purpose is to find the unknown diabetic and refer him to his physician for treatment.

Persons most likely to be diabetic are over 40, overweight, the blood relative of someone with diabetes, or mothers who have delivered a child weighing more than nine pounds. Diabetes occurs more frequently among women than men.

Additional testing sites will be available during Diabetes Detection Week, Nov. 17 through 23. Localized sites will be named in a later edition.
