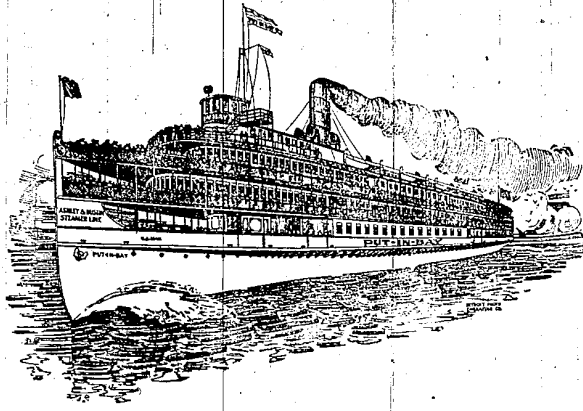


New Steamer Launched Last Saturday

Ever since boats have been christened it has been customary for some member of the fair sex to do the honors at the launching ceremony. Contrary to this custom, however, the steamer "Put-in-Bay" was christened last Saturday by a little eight-year-old boy, Master William McFall Heysler, grandson of William McFall, Dayton, O. The steamer "Put-in-Bay" was launched Saturday, March 25th, at the Wyandotte yards of the Detroit Shipbuilding Company, and it is expected that the new steamer will be ready to go into commission between Detroit, Put-in-Bay and Sandusky about June 20th.

This new boat of the Ashley & Haas Steamer line is the latest creation of the master marine designer, Frank E. Kirby, and represents the newest development in lake excursion steamers. Mr. Louis O. Keil, of Detroit, has designed the interior decorations. Both Mr. Kirby and Mr. Keil will personally supervise the construction of the steamer.

The model is entirely different from any other lake propeller. It will have a cruiser bow and its beam will extend over the guards similar to the shape of the side wheel steamer. The length, 240 feet and width of beam, 30 feet, make this steamer the largest excursion steamer on the Great Lakes. Every line of the "Put-in-Bay" will suggest grace, speed, comfort and safety. The steamer will be equipped with a four cylinder triple expansion engine and four boilers, which will develop 2000 horse power, which will propel the steamer through the water at a rate of nearly 23 miles an hour. It is believed by marine engineers that the "Put-in-Bay" will be the fastest of its class on the Great Lakes, and carry the banner like its sister ship, the Frank E. Kirby, the "Flyer" or the "Laker". It is expected that the new boat will easily reach Put-in-Bay in three hours from Detroit.

The new steamer "Put-in-Bay" will have six large decks upon which it will comfortably carry nearly 4,000 people. The orlop deck will have space for new-style forward engine room amidships and lounging room aft for passengers. This lounging room is a new novelty in excursion steamer construction. It will be furnished with Pullman seats and small tables. Light refreshments will be served here.

On the after part of the main deck there will be an elaborate dining room finished in mahogany. Large observation windows will enable the diners to have an unobstructed view of the scenery enroute. Meals will be very good here at a care at reasonable prices. The forward part of the main deck will be used as a lobby and promenade. This portion of the deck will also be provided with shutters, which can be lowered in inclement weather. Amidship of this deck there will be large cabins, comfortably furnished and of the latest designs.

On the promenade deck there will be a large grand ball room finished in mahogany, here a full orchestra will provide for continuous dancing. The 3,000 square feet of dancing space which is allotted on this deck is the largest dancing surface on any Great Lakes steamer. This deck, like the lower deck can be easily converted into a comfortable, enclosed cabin by the closing of sliding doors during bad weather. Aft of the ball room will be a refreshment stand. There will be ample room on this deck forward, aft and around the sides for passengers to be seated conveniently next to the railings.

The fourth deck or lower deck will contain the observation cabin, which is finished in white mahogany with antique silver trimmings. Leading from this cabin there will be twelve private parlors handsomely fitted in red gum wood with large mirrors, artistic furniture and French bay windows. The parlors are so arranged that the occupants can obtain a view from the bay windows over the heads of passengers seated outside. The boat deck will provide open-air seating space for passengers. On the hurricane or sixth deck, which is four feet above the boat deck, there will be one of the most unique features ever adopted on a lake steamer line. Here you will be able to reserve a steamer chair in true Trans-Atlantic style. This deck will be reserved exclusively for first class passengers holding steamer chair tickets.

The steamer "Put-in-Bay" in connection with its sister ship, the Frank E. Kirby, will maintain a daily schedule between Detroit, Put-in-Bay and Sandusky beginning about June 20th.
