Though Papa Joe's was her destination on this day, she said she usually shops Weathorn Market in Berkeley.

"Ill pay a little more to get the good quality meat and vegetables that I can's find in the grocery store," ahe said.

Westborn Market, 2245 Woodward in Berkley, is a friendly neighborhood farmstand with the added amenity of a first class meat market. Peative green-end-white-stripe sewning and yellow flags greet shoppers who browses through an array of vegetables stacked on giant crates in the openiar breezewsy. Market specials entice regulars, as do bouquets of fresh flowers and potted planta. The variety of fruit is second-to-none. The Red Gutter Band serenades on Sunday afternoons. 
