

Harrison girls perform record-setting feats

Farmington Hills Harrison tied or broke seven school records in girls track last Friday while placing second in the Lansing Waverly Invitational.

"That's the best single performance since I've been coaching here," said Harrison coach Mark Babcock, now in his 15th season. "I don't remember an evening when we had that many good performances together."

Ypsilanti won the meet with 112 points. The Hawks had 96, Holland West Ottawa 92.

Devon Kennedy tied the record set in the 200-meter dash last

year by winning the event in 25.8, and she also anchored the winning 1,600 relay team.

Amy Jenkins, Lisa Sokol and Kristine Knutson combined with Kennedy for a record time of 4:03. The old standard of 4:11.3 had stood since 1984.

Krista Snow won the high jump (16-1) and anchored the record-setting 400 relay team.

Kennedy, Monique Anderson, Erika Greene and Snow were second (50.9) and eclipsed the mark

of 51.5 set in 1983. Kennedy also tied her own record of 12.6 in the 100 dash, finishing second.

Wilson Noy was second in the 1,600 and 800 runs with record times of 5:18.8 and 2:24.0, respectively. Jenny Anderson had the 1,600 record (5:19.6) since 1980, and Noy set the 800 record (2:28) earlier this year.

With third-place finishes, Snow tied her record in the 100 hurdles (15.7), Mandi Berg had her best effort in the shot put (33-9) and Monique Anderson ran a personal best of 26.3 in the 200 dash.

Anderson also was fourth in the 100 with another personal best (12.8), Kristin Schleicher was fourth in the 600 (2:30.7) and the 800 relay team of Anderson, Greene, Jenkins and Lisa Sokol was fourth with a season best of 1:50.

Snow was fifth in the 300 hurdles (49.1), and the 3,200 relay team of Schleicher, Jenny Lapinski, Jackie Watts and Noy was fifth (10:22.8).

"We go to this meet because they use the same format as the

regional, and we use it as a tuneup for the regional," Babcock said.

"We were lucky the weather was so nice that day. We just had a great day; the coaches and kids are all very happy with it."

HARRISON 83, MONTVILLE 42: Devon Kennedy had four first places Tuesday as the Hawks finished 4-1 in the Western Division, 5-1 overall.

Kennedy won the 100 (13.1) and 200 (26.6) dashes, started the 400 relay and anchored the 1,600 relay.

Monique Anderson, Erika Greene and Krista Snow followed Kennedy in the 400 (51.9), and Amy Jenkins, Lisa Sokol and Kristine Knutson carried the baton in the 1,600 (5:19.6).

Mandi Berg had a season-best throw of 34-9 in the shot put, and Snow was first in the long jump (15-11) and the 100 hurdles (15.7).

Allison Noy won the 3,200 run (19:58.6) and anchored the winning 3,200 relay team (10:22.8) that included Kristin Schleicher, Jenny Lapinski and Knutson.

Lapinski also won the 800 run (2:29.4) and Pettit Dison the 300 hurdles (51.5).

NORTH 82, JOHN OLDFIELD 46: The Raiders had an impressive win in their Lakes Division finale Tuesday, beating a good Westland John Glenn team by a one-

sided score.

Each team finished 3-2 in the division and 4-2 overall.

Allison Gordon won the shot put with a season and Observers' best throw of 35-8, and she was first in the 100 hurdles (16.9) and the 300 hurdles (54.4).

Devon Pinal captured first in the discus with her best toss of the season, 125-11.

The Raiders won half of the running events: Monica Czerwinski, 200 (28.3); Heather Burcar, 400 (1:50.9); and Becky Naglich, 1,600 (5:54.3).

Burcar also had her best effort of the season in the long jump (10-9) but finished second to Glenn's Courtney Brown by a half inch.

Czerwinski and Burcar also teamed with Amy Lala and Carrie May to win the 800 relay (11:49.5). North was first in the 3,200 relay (11:10.7) with the team of Amanda Hough, Katie Howell, Tara Koford and Naglich.

SALEM 102, FARMINGTON 26: The Falcons had three victories — all in the field events.

Kim Washnock won the shot put with her best throw (34-11) of the season and second best in the area, and she also was first in the discus (103-7).

Andrea Salyer had the other Farmington win in the high jump (5-3). Salem finished 6-0 in the Lakes Division, 6-1 overall in dual meets, the Westland John Glenn team by a one-

Mustangs win boys title; Falcons coast

Northville captured the Western Division dual-meet boys track title Tuesday by edging Farmington Hills Harrison 68-62.

The meet was decided in the last event when the host Mustangs rallied from a 68-64 deficit in winning the 1,600-meter relay.

"Northville has one of the better mile relay teams in the state," Harrison coach Jim Hise said. "It was a great meet, though."

"It's real disappointing to lose. It was the first dual meet we've lost since April 6, 1994."

Harrison finishes 4-1 in the division and 6-1 overall.

Jon Granger had four first places for the Hawks. He won the long jump (20-5), 100 (11.2) and 200 (23.2) dashes and anchored the 800 relay team.

Kevin Bryant, who won the high hurdles (15.6), Jerrard Johnson and Ethan Altus joined Granger in the relay for a 1:32.5 time.

Nick Shaieb was a double winner in the shot put (45-8) and the discus (139-4). Doug Brodowski won the high jump (6-8) and Dave Bjorklund the 300 hurdles (42.8).

But the truth is Salem coach Geoff Baker withheld many of his best athletes to rest them for the regional Friday at Redford Union.

That was disappointing to Farmington coach Chip Bridges, who wanted a good test for his athletes to prepare them for the West Bloomfield regional Saturday.

But Bridges and the Falcons didn't mind taking the victory, which improved their records to 3-1 in the Lakes Division and 5-3 overall.

Corey Minous won three field events and helped Farmington win the 400 relay.

He threw the shot put 50-9 and the discus 135-4, and he won 19-11 in the long jump — all fine distances against any competition.

Steve Faro, Eric Rotenheiser, Minous and Jeremy Biddle did the relay in 45.6.

Matt Nikkanen won the high hurdles (16.5) and Phil Giovanni the 1,600 run (5:00), and they

combined with Steve Scania and Mike Langston to win the 1,600 relay (3:53.1).

Langston also anchored the winning 3,200 relay team, which included Matt Trunk, Ethan Smith and Nick Sertic and had a 9:25.7 time.

Bridges won the 100 dash (12.1), Sean Hassell the 200 (25.4), Ryan Hassell the 400 (55.9), Tom May the 800 (2:02.1) and Zack Papper the 3,200 (11:12).

Farmington swept the field events with Keith Sudheimer winning the high jump (6-2) and Brian Washnock the pole vault (8-6).

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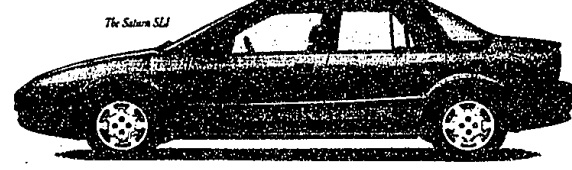
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
