"Both challengers seeking a two-year term on the Clarenceville Board of Education back the two bond Issues Clarenceville Public Schools is requesting June 12. The two other candidates on
the June ballot, incumbents
vernice Dunklee and Ronald Silye, will keep their seats come
July because they are running
unopposed for two four-year seats.

He has lived 20 of his 31 years in Clarenoeville. Clarenceville Board of Education candidates for two four-year terms are Vernice Dunkler of 19942 Maplewood, Livonia, and Ronald Sliye of 2010 Osmus, Livonia, and candidates for the one two-year term are Scott Wood of 30492 Saliabury, Farmington Hills, and Thomas Aldrich of 19305 Brentwood, Livonia.

The League asked each candidate four questions and asked each to limit their answers to 50 typed words or less. Wood did not respond to the League questionaire. The questions and answers follows:

1. What is your position on the statement that there abould be a statewide study to estab-lish a standard curriculum for all schools?

Aldrich: I would not object to a standard curriculum for all schools

schools.

Dunkies: Absolutely essential for schools to have high schievement standards. The study

should recommend a standard curriculum and then allow dis-tricts to decide how they will achieve that standard. The diver-sity of input offers a better oppor-tunity to set quality standards which genuinely meet students' needs as they approach the year 2000.

needs as they approach the year 2000.
Siltyer I don't believe the state should establish a standard curriculum. There are already too many "going-in" regulations. The state may wish to establish minimum objectives at various levels and allow the individual school systems to determine the best route for them to get there. "There are many paths through the forest."

2. What is your position on charter schools? Home schooling? Voucher system?
Aldrich: I don't know enough about charter schools to make comment.

about charter schools to make comment.

I feel that daily interaction with your peer group is an important part of a well-rounded education. I do feel, however, that people should have the option to home school within existing guidelines. I need more information to form an opinion on the voucher system. However, I am concerned about how this would impact community and school interactions.

Silve: Charter schools can offer interesting options. Howev-

some interesting options. However, I have some concern about state funding and other regulatory issues. I believe that given the freedoms that charter schools are allowed, the public school system could be much more pro-active in education rather than re-active. Home schooling also may provide some interesting alternatives. Yet teacher qualifications, instruction standards, and funding are still issues that would need to be addressed. I'm not sure home schools can be well enough equipped to provide education to the breader bases that are evolving.

I don't believe in the voucher I don't believe in the voicher system without at the very least trying fund availability to the same requirements and standards as the public school system. Where public funds are applied, the recipient must be held public-

the recipient must be held publicly accountable.

Dunkles: Destrer schools which concentrate on specific academic study, vocational/technical training or alternative programs could be extremely successful. Why not provide the opportunity and financial backing to districts so that they can seriously considerate.
