In a city where there is not a crowd but an election field, Jim Mitchell said he's running for Farmington City Council.

Mitchell, 44, joins incumbents Bill Hartstock and JoAnne McShane, who have taken out nominating petitions for the Nov. 7 election. Three seats are open in this year's race.

Candidates vie for two four-year terms and one two-year term. Councilman Dick Tupper said he's not going to run for re-election, which leaves one seat open to a challenger.

Mitchell believes he's the one to fill it. The 40-year Farmington resident has been on the Planning

Commission since 1987 and was involved in developing the city's aesthetics ordinance passed last year.

"I think over the last few years we've been involved in redevelopment in the downtown and other commercial districts," said Mitchell, who lives on Floral Street. "I think I can bring that perspective."

Mitchell, who is single, is vice president for administration and legal counsel for Lifetime Doors in Farmington Hills. He's been with the company for 11 years. Previously, he had his own law practice for seven years.

He is a 1969 graduate of Our

Lady of Sorrows School. He has a bachelor's degree in history and political science from the University of Michigan and a juris doctor from the University of Detroit.

People have encouraged him to run, he said. Mitchell thinks the time's right, especially with three open seats and only two incumbents.

The council is doing a good job, Mitchell said.

"I feel they view themselves as a board of directors. At least that's been my perspective," he said. "They set good policy and let the city manager run the city... That's the role I'd want to continue."

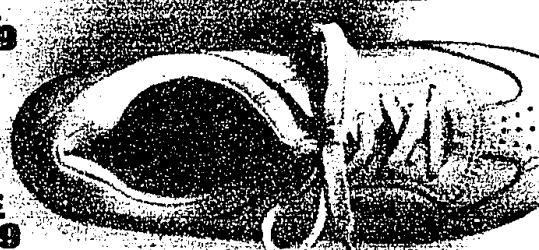
