Chernauckas, a Ladywood High School graduate, is currently attending the University of Michigan, Dearborn campus majoring in international studies. She volunteers with the Michigan Cancer Foundation and the American Lung Association.
The title wins Chernauckas, 19, at least \$1,000 in scholarship money, a \$125 gift certificate and other prizes. She was sponsored by Contemporary Awards.
Chernauckas hopes to graduate from the University of Michigan Law School and pursue a career as a corporate lawyer. "I would also like to open my own Russian Ballet School," Chernauckas wrote on her pageant fact sheet.
Pageant executive director Ginny Morris said she was excited about working with Chernauckas during her year-long reign, ap-

pearing at various community events.
"I've known Audrey for two or three other pageants and she knows she can call me after 2 a.m.," Morris said, winking at Chernauckas.
"I'm very happy with all three of my new girls," Morris said referring to all three winners.
The first runner up was Annette M. Hohl, a Ladywood High School graduate, attending Michigan State University majoring in theater and journalism. She talked about how self-esteem can help people attain their dreams. Hohl, who performed a tap routine, was sponsored by Burger King.
The second runner up was Kimberly Christine Seed, 20, who also won the Miss Congeniality award. She performed a piano solo and was sponsored by

Flags abounded and the music followed suit for the patriotic theme in celebration of 75 years of the Miss America Program and in commemoration of the 50th anniversary of the end of World War II.
