

POLICE/FIRE CALLS

Listed below are some of the Farmington-area police incidents, fire calls and court cases reported during the past week.

DRUNKEN DRIVING

Farmington Hills police arrested a South Lyon man, 30, at 6:37 p.m. July 4 on westbound Grand River west of Eight Mile. Officers pulled over a gray 1990 Olds Cutlass after it passed the police car at 62 mph in a 45 mph zone. The driver had a blood alcohol level of .14 percent. A level of 1 percent or higher is considered too drunk to drive in Michigan.

Police nab man after gun threat

Farmington Hills police arrested a Hills man, 20, for threatening to shoot two men over a dispute at the tennis courts at Oakland Community College in Farmington Hills July 10.

According to reports, two men were playing tennis at about 7 p.m. when the man, who was roller skating on the court, got into an argument with them.

The two said the man threatened to kill them with a rifle. He went back to his maroon 1994 Honda Accord and came back with a gun, witnesses told police.

When officers arrived, the man had left and people were fleeing the tennis court. Officers tracked the car to the Big Boy restaurant parking lot on Orchard Lake.

The man argued with them when they confronted him, and his brother, 23, shot at them and eventually had to be placed in a police car to keep him from interfering with the arrest.
