Stage set for showdown between league leaders

Decision Consultants and Hines Park Lincoln-Mercury are on a collision course for a season-ending first-place showdown in the Livonia Collegiate Baseball League.

Rope climbing requires fitness

There is a new Reebok Sports Club in New York I visited recently. One of the activities featured was climbing a rope. I watched as extreme physically fit young men were climbing with no problem. Is this a skill that can be taught? Is it a matter of physical endurance, or skill, or both? Amazing!

Yes, it is amazing! It takes a lot to climb that rope. It takes coordination, good strength, hands, good upper torso strength and all-around good condition. Once you've got those physical attributes, rope climbing is a skill to learn.

The key to learning to climb a rope is found in the concept of gravity.

When you hang a rope in standard fashion — vertically from ceiling — and ask someone to climb it, that person naturally will be working against gravity. In rope climbing, the resistance is enough to test a real athlete.

A good way to learn rope climbing is to start with the rope in a horizontal position (rope extended horizontally across an area). The work load is reduced enough so that anyone who can hang on can learn the skill. To increase resistance simply change the angle gradually from the horizontal position.

When the rope finally becomes vertical, consider yourself a grad-
