Donald Sultan admits his paintings, more than likely, were influenced by his early years.

The internationally-known artist worked in construction to put himself through school, first at the University of North Carolina, then the School of the Art Institute of Chicago, where he earned a master of fine arts degree. Previous to that while growing up in Asheville, N.C., from a young age he painted with his father, who "wanted to be an artist" but owned a tire business instead, to support his family.

That's probably where the dark, leavy, volumetric grounds came from. Initially in my work, I had been using plantic. The materials (for the tar pointings) became a cheap way to nanke an impact, 'Sultan said in an interview from his apartment on Paris' Hight Bank off the Champs Elysecs.

'My paintings are rich in surface texture, very controlled of surface. They're very physical works that lead the way to the reemergence of imagery in abstract art.

Sultan has an exhibition of his drawing and painting at the Hill Gallery in Birmingham. He recently spoke about the continuity of images in his work at a lecture hosted by the Friends of Modern Art at the Dotroit Institute of Arts.

Sultan doesn't paint canvases as much as he builds them.

Using unconventional materials, he constructs one, four- and eightfoot paintings on pine frames that project the surfaces several incluse from the wall. Layering lindeum tiles, plaster, tar and finally oil paint with colorations learning toward the moody side onto the frame, Sultan crafts a structure much like a sculptor manipulating the clay on a ormature. Seams between the tiles zometimes show through like a memory of what's underneath leading the viewer to decode the process.
