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## Redesigned Honda Civic goes where it hasn't gone before

EAST LIBERTY, Ohio — Slipping behind the wheel of the redesigned Honda Civic, you almost have to get out and make sure you're in the right

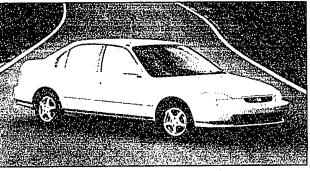
make sure you're in the right car.
Yep, it's a 1996 Honda Civic. But like no Civic has been before. It's roomy. It's got a functional back seat. The doors sound solid when you close them. And, hey, it's even kinda

them. And, hey, it's even kinda cute.

Not small cute.
The Civic has always been known as a "teeny weeny" car.
Make that really teeny. Remember the Civic CRX?
Man, that was small.
This new Civic is now in its sixth generation — Honda started selling the Civic here in 1972. And now, all these years later, the company's East Liberty plant is the largest single producer of Civic worldwide.

A little more about East

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automaker (and East Liberty is the only auto plant in the world) to accomplish comple-tion of a running model change in the midst of a plant produc-tion increase of more than 30

percent.
To effectively ramp up production of the 1996 models, while completing orders for the 1995 Civies, East Liberty was producing both 1995 and 1996 model Civies on the same line, at the same time.
By late September, Honda had finished its 1995 run and

began exclusively building 1996 Civics.

By the end of this month, the plant is expected to be building around 800 Civics a day for us here in the U.S. market and for expert to Japan and other countries.

That translates in 265,000 domestically earmarked Civics for the 1996 model year, with 40,000 more being exported.

Back to the car.

Back to the car.
Enjoying its first major makeover since the 1991 model year, the Givic is still classified as a small car, but its really bigger, quieter, faster and more fuel efficient than it has ever been. It's also more distinctive in styling.
Three models are a sliable this year: A sedan, coupe and hatchback. All three have smart styling, stiff bodies, better engines than their predecessors and new transmiscessors and new transmis-

Now this is cool: The Civic HX coupe is available with a

new, innovative automatic transmission Honda calls CVT — Continuously Variable

--- Continuously Variable Transmission. What Honda has done here is melded the fuel efficiency of a manual transmission and the performance of an automatic.

performance of an automatic.
What this means is that it's totally shiftless. You stomp on the gas and the rpms rev up without ever having a shift-back on the car. There's never an interruption of power, cither.
This feature is a little upperving because you expect.

unnerving because you expect to feel the car shift up a gear. But it never does.

But it never does.

The Civic is also available with an improved 5-speed electronically controlled automatic on most models.

The automatic features Honda's grade logic control for smother shifting when climbing or descending hills. Anti-lock brakes are standard on the EX sedan and are optional

on the other models.

The Civic EX is also powered by a high performance 127-horsepower VTEC engine. The Civic HX coupe has an improved VTEC-E engine with 115 horses that promise a whopping 39 mph in the city, 45 on the highway.

Altogether there are three 1.6-liter 16-valve engines available. The new 106-horsepower engine is the first production gasoline engine to meet California's low-emission standards.

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Air conditioning and remote entry system are also standard on the EX models. Standard on all models is an AMFM stereo and clock. The stereo is pre-wired for a security system.

Instrumentation is laid out well. The speedometer has a 247-degree sweep that's neat. All other instrumentation—including a tach, coolant temp and fuel-level gauge—is background.

Scating is comfy in front—with enough leg room for anyone under 6-foot-2. The back seats, again, are functional for

seats, again, are functional for normal-sized people. Just don't push the seats all the way back. You'll fit, but the knees will touch the back of the front

All in all, the new Civic is a "small" car that's fun to drive, easy on the pocket and easy on the trips to the gas station.

## Preventive Car Care Can Save Lives

(CCC)—Accidents directly attributable to neglected whiche maintenance (worm brakes and tites, poor vision, blee to neglected whiche maintenance (worm brakes and tites, poor vision, loose attering, etc.) enuld be costing the American public billions of dollars annually. This statement, from the Car Care Council, is based on a National lighway Treffic Safety Administration estimate of \$137.5 billion annual cost of which are D.U.J.-related driver impairment, this still leaves an accident tab totaling more than \$90 billion. Five to fifteen percent of this cost might be a verted through periodic inspection and maintenance of vihicles, according to industry estimates. Even the more concrevative figure, which would place a \$4.5 billion price tag on mechanically related accidents, stresses the need for greater concern for aftery maintenance.

Beyond the concentric, concludes the Council's statement, is the impact of personal injury, loss of life and property. Consider that for every American lost during the 42 days of Operation lost during the 42 days of Operation Desert Storm, several more died on our nation's highways because of accidents due to a whiche failure. Both types of losses are trajic and unacceptable, and certainly the latter is preventible.
