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Fun-to-drive Geo Tracker a good choice for college kids

Finally, someone was using their head over at Warren's General Motors Tech Center.

Ever since it is introduction as a "apecial purpose vehicle" in 1989, the Geo Tracker has only been available in both 2 and 4-door model. Its sistencar, the Sutuki Sidekick, was available in both 2 and 4-door models.

Both the Sidekick and Tracker are built by CAMI Automotive Inc. in Ingersell, Ontario, Canada, through a joint venture between GM and Suruki Motor Co. Ltd. Suruki has long enjoyed exclusive sales of the 4-door model and I figured it would never give that up.

That's all changed.

Fer 1936, the Geo Tracker hard-top enjoys two more doors, a lot more headroom and hiproom (3 inches) and more than 12 more cubic feet of cargo room.

All that translates into a lot more

and more than 12 hole to the correction.

All that translates into a lot more comfort in the new Geo Tracker.

The 2-door model is still available, but with the 4-door Tracker, it's a larger compact sport utility (does, that make sense?) than ever before. Anyone planning to utilize that back seat is much better off with the 4-door model.

And you know what? Even with four doors, the Tracker doesn't lose any of its cute look. Or its sporti-ness. Or its 4x4 capabilities.

And it's even a little bit fun to drive ... if you can get past the clunky uncomfortable, nearly impos-sible to shift 5-speed manual trans-mission. I've known how to shift for about 20 years now — most of the cars I evaluate are 5-speeds — and this transmission seemed to get hung up in third for some reason.

As the week progressed, I learned to slam it into the third gear to get it in, but that's no way to drive a vehicle. And it wasn't just me — a few other evaluators noticed its hard-to-

Me? Even though you'll experience a loss of real control with an automatic, I'd opt for it — just for aggravation's sake.

One more observation for the wish list: It needs a much better sus-

wish list: It needs a much better suspension package.
You could argue that because it's
got nearly 6 inches ground clearance
and is, essentially, marketed toward
people who want sa't capabilities, it's
really a rougher-than-normal ride.
But those were the only disappointments in the Tracker.
Because it's high off the ground,
you've got great visibility. Oh — visibility is better in the '96 because
there's a lot more glass. It's almost
like a greenhouse. It's got a wider
stance, too, for better stability.
And when was the last time you

And when was the last time you got into any vehicle that you could realistically wear a cowboy hat in? The Tracker actually has that much headroom. Honest — I put on my own cowboy hat and it fit with not so much as a rub.

Evaluated was the Lsi Hardtop model, which has a 97.6-inch wheel-base, nearly a foot longer than the 2-door model. And the Tracker has a

much wider stance that translates into a more solid, stable vehicle.

Although there isn't a drastichange in the new Tracker, it does have a revised facta, grille and hood design. Instrumentation design has also been changed to accommodate standard dual airbags.
Also now is the addition of an optional convenience package that includes power windows, doer locks and mirrors. Also available a options are electronic speed control and stereo speakers mounted on top of the instrument panel. of the instrument panel.

The standard 1.6-liter 16-valve
SOHC 4-cylinder aluminum-block
engine provides 95 horsepower. It's
adequate for a small vehicle, but
don't expect to win any drag races
down Woodward.

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The engine can also tow up to 1,500 pounds when equipped with the optional tow package and can be mated to three configurations: A 5-speed manual, 3-speed automatic or a brand new 4-speed automatic transmission.

Other standard features include daytime running lamps, child security rear-door locks, center console

with dual cupholders and storage apace for CDs and other personal stuff, reclining front bucket scats, rear folding bench seat and cloth

scats.

Consider the Tracker perfect for a college kid or as a second "fun" vehicle for the family.
