Volunteers sought for president's forum

Some 800 spirited volunteers—including many from Oakland County—will be on hand May 18-25 when the President's Committee on Employment of People with Disabilities meets at the Westin Hotel in Detroit.

The conference — "Investing In Ability" — is expected to draw more than 3,000 business, labor, government and disability advocates from the U.S. and Canada. It is Detroit's first-ever president's conference on disability concerns.

"Our focus is on the ability not the disability of workers," said Patrick Cannon, executive director of Michigan Commission on Disability Concerns.
Cannon said the conference will help dispet the myth that people with disabilities are cestly to employ, injured more often on the

job and absent more often than other workers.

While conference-goers attend some 60 workshops aimed at promoting the smployment of people with disabilities, wolunteers will help run the 50th annual event, said Frank Hazard, volunteer committee oc-chair and executive director of Southfield-based Kenny Rehab.

Oakland County business people interested in joining the volunteer effort during the President's Committee on Employment of People With Disabilities may call Kenny Rehab, (810) 552-0202, or the Michigan Commission on Disability Concerns, (800) SAY-ABLE.

President Bill Clinton is expected to attend the national conference, Hazard said.
