

POLICE/FIRE CALLS

Listed below are some of the Farmington-area police incidents, fire calls and court cases reported during the past week.

Mail tampering probed

U.S. Postal inspectors are investigating a case of mail tampering in which a Farmington woman was the victim.

The Elizabeth Court resident called postal officials after noticing fraudulent charges on her J.C. Penney charge card statement. Items were ordered with her charge from a catalog, according to a Farmington police report.

A secretary at Our Lady of Sorrows also informed the woman that the church had received a postal change of address notice for her. The notice listed a Freeland Street ad-

dress in Detroit.

A few days later, the woman said she received a phone call from a man identifying himself as "Sergeant Thomas" with J.C. Penney security. He asked for her spouse's social security number.

When she refused to give the number to him, he became angry. Postal officials found that a Thomas is listed at the Freeland address.

The woman, 72, believes some mail has been stolen. She doesn't recall receiving a December statement from J.C. Penney.
