## OFF DAY FOR HOME TEAM

Redford and Wixom Turned the  
Tricks that Beat Us Out

TOOK BOTH GAMES EASILY

Foul Tip Breaks Miller Davis'  
Thumb and a Conrade Falls  
While Watching the  
Surgeon Operate

Decorating day proved an off day for F. H. S. base ball team. Redford team journeyed into town early Tuesday morning and at 10:30 faced our F. H. S. team on the home diamond.

Clarence Hutchins pitched a good game for the Redford boys and led his team to victory to the tune of 6 to 4.

Johnson pitched a good game for Farmington during the first part of the game, but the team playing on Farmington's behalf was pretty loose.

A very painful accident happened to Miller Davis, catching for Farmington. It was in the last of the sixth. Johnson sent in a fast out drop when Watkins fouled it, and the ball caroming off the bat at terrific speed caught Davis on the thumb, dislocating it and laying the flesh open until the bone appeared bare. Davis was escorted to Dr. Miller's office where the doctor discovered that one of the ligaments had been wrenched from its place and driven over the end of the joint bone necessitating a very painful surgical operation for its replacing. Forrest Dickerson, who was acting as Davis' escort,

fainted dead away in the doctor's office as he watched the operation. Forrest is too sympathetic in his make up for such cruel tasks.

In the meantime Farmington held her own on the diamond. Travis went to first, Johnson caught and Gildemeister pitched. But, though the boys played clever ball towards the end, they could not pull down the palm of victory. The final score was 4 to 6 in Redford's favor.

After the interesting services held in the town hall, F. H. S. again adjourned to the local diamond and faced a town team from Wixom, made up of professional ball players from almost all over Michigan. The management of F. H. S. team had signed up a game with Wixom school team, but this team being unable to leave Wixom Tuesday, sent their big team instead. They of course proved too much for our High school boys, but gave them a good practice game anyway.

It is said that Herman Austin, who pitched for Wixom has been offered a salary of considerable proportions to go with professional teams. He certainly is a fine twirler. One of his best, among his numerous collection, is a dandy spit-ball which had a great break to it.

Gildemeister pitched the first two innings for Farmington while Johnson caught. During the rest of the game they just reversed, Gildemeister catching and Johnson pitching. The F. H. S. boys played a far nicer game of ball in the afternoon than they did in the morning. The score was 4 to 14 in Wixom's favor.

The Wixom team was a jolly lot of married men.

South Lyons has forfeited both of her league game to Farmington and will not play on the home diamond next Saturday. The management however promise a much better game, having secured a game with Pontiac high school.
