

# Raiders top Patriots in 1st soccer victory

Cooker Perkins scored the only goal on a breakaway as North Farmington defeated host Livonia Franklin 1-0 Wednesday in girls soccer.

"It was the first victory of the season for the Raiders after three losses. "I moved her to outside half-back (from center-mid) to spread the field and it worked," North coach Tim Russell said.

"We were having a little trouble with our offense as far as getting the wings involved, and having Cooker on the outside really helped us there."

Russell also moved Perkins, as well as Natalie Reje from sweeper to right fullback, because of injuries to leaden the amount of contact they had and field they had to cover.

Perkins was nursing an ankle injury while Reje was slowed by a sore hip.

With Perkins on the wing, Russell moved defender Mike Wachberg into the center-mid positions since the Raiders weren't being tested defensively, he added.

"In the last two games, we've had a problem juggling up at the 18 (yard line)," Russell said. "We were unable to work the wings."

"We had a lot of scoring chances, but they were ugly because we were jamming it right up the middle. We needed to spread the offense out a little more."

Meike Ziegler was in goal for the Raiders and earned the shut out.

"She was tested a lot more in the second half, and she came up uses for us," Russell said.

**FARMINGTON 7, GLENN 2**  
Angela DeBenedictis scored three goals and had two assists for the Falcons in the win Wednesday over host Westland John Glenn.

The victory improved Farmington to

2-1 in the Lakes Division and 2-2 overall.

Jamie Jakacki scored two goals. Kelly Kamit and Ennie Villemonte one apiece. Villemonte also had two assists. Jakacki, Josh Gubert and Angel Newman assisted on one goal each.

Farmington had double the number of shots (20-10), and Annemarie Scario was in goal the whole game for the Falcons. Farmington led 3-1 at halftime.

"The system seems to be working very well on the offensive end and good in the middle, we still need to work on the defense, but it will get better," Farmington coach Bob Neff said.

He added he is pleased with the play of the forward line, which includes Villemonte, Jakacki and Tiffany Okopnik.

**BISHOP FOLEY 4, MERCY 1**  
The defending Catholic League champion Ventures took a 3-0 first-half lead over the host Marlins and maintained the advantage through the final 40 minutes.

Colleen Sissman scored the lone Mercy goal with an assist from Annie Salter. Foley had twice as many shots (14-7) as the Marlins.

Mercy is 1-2-1 in the Catholic League and 3-2-1 overall. The Ventures are 3-0.

"We're at a turning point right now," Mercy coach Deepak Shrivastava said. "We're either going to have a decent season or a miserable season."

"We have the work ethic and talent, but we're not playing as a team. You can't be the world's best coach, but that's something they have to find within themselves."

"They need each other, and they're not playing like that. It's unfortunate because it's getting in the way of the team's progress."

**CANTON 5, HARRISON 0**: The defending Western Lakes co-champion City scored five goals Wednesday, but Harrison goalkeeper Sara Kloosterman stopped 43 other shots and "played just an outstanding game," according to coach Glenn Fruchon. "Canton looked really good," he said. "They're tremendous dribblers and were too much for us to handle."

# Trojans undefeated in Metro

It's still early, but Livonia Clarenceville's baseball team is riding high right now in the Metro Conference with a 2-0 record.

The Trojans rallied for four runs in the bottom of the seventh inning, capped by Rob Ashton's RBI single, scoring Jack Stallings, to stun defending champion Harper Woods on Friday, 9-6.

"The victory was sweet in more ways than one. Clarenceville starter Scott Hatch, a right-hander, made his first varsity start ever in a Trojan uniform.

Hatch, who was struck by a car while riding his bike in a September of 1993, was in a coma for six days and spent six weeks in the hospital, not to mention nearly three years of extensive rehabilitation.

"Scott's been an inspiration to the team, and just from what he's accomplished is incredible," Clarenceville coach Mark McDonald said. "His pitching performance today impressed us. He was really into it."

"It's a good team win and I'm happy for Scott. This will make him a better pitcher down the road."

Hatch, who made a brief relief appearance in the season opener against Farmington Hills Harri-

son, put up decent numbers over 4 1/3 innings - allowing four hits, three earned runs, three walks to go along with four strikeouts.

The right-hander was removed in the fifth with one out after giving up a pair of walks and an infield single as Harper Woods (1-1) pulled to within a run, 4-3. Ashton came on in relief.

"I really wanted that first win," Hatch said. "But it was smart to take me out when they did."

The host Trojans jumped on Harper Woods' starter Brian Bayer for four runs in the first.

Consecutive singles by John Wallace, Paul Inzano and Brian DeCaire, coupled with a Harper Woods infield error, made it 1-0.

Junior first baseman Bob Wynn then delivered a clutch double into the right field gap, clearing the bases for a 4-0 advantage.

Hatch, meanwhile, retired the first six batters he faced, but Harper Woods tallied a pair of runs on three hits to cut the deficit in half to 4-2 in the top of the third.

In the top of the fifth, Jason Hartland got the second of three bloop infield hits on the day for the Pioneers to score Jay Summers. But Ashton slammed the door by fanning the next two batters to get out of the inning.

The Trojans gave themselves a two-run cushion in the bottom half of the frame when DeCaire led off with a walk, stole second and scored on Wynn's single.

Dinastrer, however, struck Clarenceville in the sixth as Harper Woods sent 10 batters to the plate with a five-run outburst.

Two Trojan infield fielding errors, along with a Texus League, threw gasoline on the fire.

Bayer then carried a three-run lead into the seventh, but Clarenceville was not to be denied.

The bottom of the seventh started with back-to-back doubles by Inzano and DeCaire, cutting the gap to 8-6.

Scott Barnhard then singled and DeCaire scored when the Harper Woods shortstop overthrew the first-base bag on a routine grounder.

Harper Woods coach Scott Wynn then made a pitching change, removing Bayer in favor of Eddie Stankowski.

The runners held as Stankowski got Wynn on a groundout to first, but John Shiffman was intentionally walked to load the bases.

Designated hitter Kirk Dams then came through with a single, scoring Barnhard, and Ashton followed by ripping a shot past the third base bag to bring Stallings home with the game-winning.

# Shamrocks stop Seaholm star, stun No. 2 Maples

Keep Jordan Herrick off the scoreboard and you have a good chance of beating the Birmingham Seaholm boys lacrosse team.

Herrick, bound for the University of North Carolina on a lacrosse scholarship, didn't score a goal Thursday night against Detroit Catholic Central's
