OCC trustee candidates make pitch for faculty support

One candidate for trustee sent ripples of surprise through the Oakland Community College Fac-uity Association by saying he would "decline" the union's en-dorsement. Most others, including the challenged incumbent, said facul-ty interests were close to college interests and welcomed union support.

Six of the nine candidates for two seats in the June 10 election showed up April 19 for a dinnerhour meeting with a few dozen of the college community on OCGs Orchard Ridge Campus in Farmington Hills.

Kohl, adding he has represented many United Auto Workers members and has "a particular affinity for the UAW."

"I'll dake your endorsement," said Ritter, a Waterford public schools teacher and three-term incumbent on the OCC board. "I would like everyone to recognize we have the same interest — the students."

Ritter promised to listen to the faculty and respond but added "it's not always the way you like." Ritter told of attending union meetings in her girlhood with an aunt and willingly signing up with the Amorican Federation of Teachers and MEA.

Dr. Thomas Sullivan, a dentist from Rochester Hills with a practice in Bloomfield Hills, said, "I hope your endorsement would be based on what I can give to OCC," adding he was a union member seven years before becoming a dentist.

fired Dr. Calkins last fall, causing fired Dr. Calkins last fall, causing a major political upheaval across the county, leading to a failed effort to recall five board members and resulting in the current effort to unseat Ritter.
