Now, it is also available at Sheets in Royal Oak, Little Foxes at the Fox Theatre and by direct mail (1-513-667-5035).

And 100 percent of the proceeds go to benefit Wellness House, a metro-Datroit non-profit agency serving without charge people with HIV/AIDS in Oak-land and Wayne counties.

"Everything has come out of his (Pangborn's) pocket," reports Ken Malecke, development director for Wellness House and an Oakland

County resident.
"Usuelly (in these kinds of deals) the percentage going back to the non-profit group is minimal. We get 100 percent. He even does the shipping."
"I have a lot of friends and associ-ates that have contracted HIV," ex-

plains Pangborn, married and the fa-ther of Oliver, a student at Northwest-

ern University.

"It's scary to see their bodies just wither away. It's not that much differ-

Three years ago, when they started the Red Ribbon Ball, we just donated some of our ties as door prizes, Pang-hom recalls, "It was Ken's idea to develop a product - initially a T-shirt.

But then came the thought, "Why couldn't we create something more fashion-oriented?

Pangborn created a playful, colorful design surrounding a white dancing figure, inspired by artist Henri Mattisse's style and particularly, his signature painting, 'Dance.'

"Pets in AIDS families have had a wenderful life," says veterinarian Dr. Kenneth Genova of The Pet Practice in

"They are a great asset to their lives. Our goal is to make sure those pets get

inte good homes."
The Pet Practice, with Oakland County branches in Southfield, Farmcounty orancees in southield, Farmington Hills, Royal Oak and Waterford, is one of the first veterinary hospitals to sign up to work with Wellness House of Michigan to essist people with HIV/AIDS who have pets.

Linds Snow, hospital manager for
Westcott Veterinary Care Centers,
helped develop the pet care program.
"As the HIV disease progresses, the
individual becomes unable to care for
themselves. The virus ultimately does
not allow the client to hold a job,"
Snow says.

"It has been our experience that in most homes with a pet, that the animal can be neglected," she says. "Eventually, as the disease worsens, food and care for these animals can not be provided. Finally, another home for these pets must be found when their owner dies."

The program includes: Free animal food donated by IAMS, Purina and Hills manufacturers.
