

Dozens meet deadline for election

Gorcyca comes out slugging in county prosecutor's race

Challenger David G. Gorcyca wasted no time.

As he announced his candidacy for Oakland County Prosecutor Tuesday, Gorcyca, the Royal Oak City commissioner and 1980 graduate of Birmingham Brother Rice High School, accused incumbent Richard Thompson of fabricating conviction statistics and wasting resources and tax money.

Thompson uses "home baked" statistics when he claims a conviction rate of 90 percent or higher, Gorcyca said. "The real conviction rate is closer to 60 percent."

The conviction rate is the percentage of defendants found guilty in court.

Thompson claims a conviction - or success - rate in

excess of 96 percent, which would mean 96 out of 100 defendants are convicted.

Gorcyca said the actual number is more like 60 out of 100.

The incumbent intentionally cites those "home baked" statistics to cover up his "failed policies" and to support his claim of being tough on crime, said Gorcyca.

"We need tough justice, not just tough talk," he said.

Thompson, a Clarkston resident, again claimed a conviction rate higher than 90 percent Tuesday afternoon at a press conference following the acquittal of Dr. Jack Kevorkian.

Gorcyca's claim that he inflates that figure is "ridiculous," said the prosecutor.
