In a decade-long tenure as Plymouth Canton girls soccer coach, Don Smith's teams have always been winners.

The Chiefs have never had a losing season and twice have been ultimate winners, capturing Class A championships in 1988 and again this year.

For leading Canton successfully through another state tournament, Smith has been named Coach of the Year in Observerland.

The Chiefs, who were unranked and underdogs in several playoff contests, eliminated three rated teams and won six of seven tournament games by shutout en route to the state title.

Smith's teams have been district champs seven of the last nine seasons and state runners-up twice.

Canton has a .769 winning percentage while compiling a record of 155-31-14 from 1987-96 under Smith, who also coached the Canton boys to a state title in 1994.

The 1996 All-Observer team has two repeat selections: Livonia Churchill's Marie Spaccaretella, who is a four-time honoree, and Plymouth Salem's Mari Hoff. Both are high-scoring, senior forwards.

Salem sophomore midfielder Mia Sarkeesian, Farmington Harrison junior goalie Sara Kloosterman, and Farmington Hills Mercy junior forward Jena Kluska were second-team picks last year.

goals and eight assists. In two years of varsity play, she has 27 career goals and 20 assists.

"Melissa is a true athlete whose soccer will improve each year," coach Don Smith said. "She plays with the intensity of a champion."

Mia Sarkeesian, halfback, Ply. Salem: Sarkeesian is one of only two sophomores on the Class A all-state team, and she also made the All-WLAA team. She helped at both ends of the field but is at her best on the offensive attack. Sarkeesian scored 14 goals and recorded seven assists.

"Her strength was definitely going forward," coach Doug Landefeld said. "Her goals were all big-time goals. There weren't many mop-up goals for either her or Hoff. Mia is a dream for a coach to work with."

Angela DeDomenico, halfback, Farmington: DeDomenico is a key playmaker, as well as an offensive threat, from the center-midfield position. She had six goals and six assists this year with 36 shots attempted.

In two seasons of varsity play for the Falcons, she has scored 10 goals and been credited with eight assists. DeDomenico was a first-team All-WLAA selection, all-state honorable mention and team co-captain.

"Angela is a playmaker on offense and quite often begins the plays that form the attack on our opponent's goal," Farmington coach Bob Neff said. "Defensively, she actively participates in controlling play in the midfield."

Candace Perkins, halfback, N. Farmington: Perkins started the season in the center-midfield position but moved to a wing to give the Raiders more offensive punch. The result was a 13-goal season.

She was a four-year varsity starter, team most valuable player this year and two-time All-Lakes Division choice. Perkins, who also played basketball and volleyball, received the Raider Cup as the outstanding senior student-athlete at North Farmington.

"Coker was as extremely important to us this year, not only for her statistics but her role in helping a young team develop," North coach Tim Russell said.

Anne Fedrigo, halfback, Liv. Stevenson: Fedrigo was named to the Class A all-state first team and the All-WLAA team. She likes the role of an attacking midfielder, contributing nine goals and five assists this year.

Fedrigo is a three-year varsity player and was a team tri-captain along with Angie Pandoff and Marie Vanderburgh. Her career totals are 18 goals and 21 assists.

"Anne is the best player, the most knowledgeable and hardest-working player I have," coach Jim Kimble said. "Obviously, that's why she's where she is now."

As a returning player next year, she will be the leader of the Stevenson girls team. It was difficult for her as a junior, because she did have seniors ahead of her. She leads by example and is well respected by her teammates and most of the people in the Western Lakes.

Andrea Sudik, defender, Ply. Salem: Good teams play good defense, and that's why Salem is always among the best teams. Players like Sudik might be unsung but are vital to the team success.

Sudik was All-Lakes Division, a scholar-athlete, honors graduate and recipient of the Presidential Fitness Award. Defending was her forte, but she did have three assists.

Mari Hoff, forward, Ply. Salem: Hoff, who moved from midfielder to forward this year, scored 20 goals and could have had more, according to coach Doug Landefeld. The Dream Team All-Stater had six assists.

Hoff ended her high school career with 69 goals and 34 assists. She also received the President's Scholar Athlete Award at Salem and was first-team All-WLAA.

"Mari is the best all-around player in the state, and her work ethic is matched by no one," Landefeld said. "She came out of a lot of games early because we were ahead, so her stats are misleading. The reason she didn't win Miss Soccer is because she didn't score 44 goals. That's why everyone loves her; she's such a good team player."

Marie Spaccaretella, forward, Liv. Churchill: Spaccaretella capped a fabulous four-year varsity career with a 23-goal season for the Chargers. Recognized as one of the fastest players in the state, she scored 102 goals in her career.

Spaccaretella could start a scoring play as well as finish one. Besides being a prolific scorer, she also had nearly 40 career assists.

The Dream Team All-Stater is going to the University of Michigan on a soccer scholarship.

"Marie is the best goal scorer in the history of Churchill High School," coach Nick O'Shea said. "Her determination to score far surpasses any player I've ever coached."

Jena Kluska, forward, Farm. Mercy: Kluska, a three-year varsity player, scored 22 goals and assisted on five others. She served as team captain and earned first-team All-Catholic honors.

"Jena has an excellent work ethic, is a natural goal scorer and is a strong leader by example," coach Gary Deepak Shivaraman said.

Melissa Marzoff, forward, Ply. Canton: Marzoff was the primary scoring threat for the state champion Chiefs with 17
