Mitchell's power helps Rams sweep Appliance

Jason Mitchell hit his third home run of the season during the Michigan Rams' doubleheader sweep over Detroit Adray Appliance, 5-4 and 6-0, on Adray Metro Baseball Association action, Sunday at Henry Ford Community College.

Mitchell, a 1994 Redford Union graduate who plays at Eastern Michigan University, went 2-for-3, including as solo homer, scored twice and stole a base in the nightcap.

"(Zahn) had us focus on pitching down and on the corners. Hitting the spots was more important than in the past. He was real demanding as a pitching coach, and that really helped our staff."

Having started as a walk-on player, the progression and conclusion to Temple's career at Michigan was a gratifying experience for him.

"Coming out of high school, a lot of people said 'He won't play there.' I didn't just want to be a roster player; I wanted to be someone who made a difference, and I think did, especially this year."

Temple is also an excellent student and is doing a summer internship with an engineering firm while pitching for the Birmingham Lynx team.

He has another year to finish his degree and will have it paid under the terms of his scholarship. If he had been drafted or signed as a free agent, Temple would have had to weigh that opportunity against the loss of his scholarship.

"That's a lot of money to give up if you're only going to be filling out a roster for the summer," he said. "I have friends who signed and were released before

the next draft.

"I have something other than baseball in my life. Having something else I can do made it easier, too."

The only team that called was the Detroit Tigers, but Temple said he understood why he was not drafted or no other teams expressed an interest.

"I knew it was a longshot, but because of the year I had I thought somebody might want to take a chance," he said, adding his age and not being a power pitcher were factors against him.

"I'm 22 years old and most of the guys who were drafted are 18 and 19," the right-handed Temple said. "Twenty-two is pushing the limit. I'm not 6-foot-6 either; so size probably hurt me."

"They like pitchers who throw in the upper 80s and low 90s. I definitely don't fall into that category. I'm consistent in the mid 80s. At 22 I'm probably not going to get any faster."

Ending where he did is fine with Temple, however.

"It's not hard to leave, knowing the last time I played it was for Michigan. It was a dream to play at Michigan, and it came true in a big way for me."
