Shoplifting spree attracts attention of Hills police

Farmington Hills police hit paydirt when they put out the word about two black, middle-aged men driving a white car away from Sears Roebuck Co. on Middlebelt Tuesday after-

When the pair was stopped
by Southfield police at Shiawassee and Inkater minutes
later, not only did officers
recover the items allegedly
stolen from the local Sears,
but they also found merchandise from four other retail
outlets.

According to a witness of
the Sears incident, the two
men, one on crutches and the
other one in a cast for his
arm, were leaning against the
1981 Oldsmobile Cutlass
parked in front of the store
to around 12-45 p.m.

The witness was pulling
around the side of the store to
drop off some merchandise.

When the witness pulled his own car back around to the front of the store, he saw the duo and their ear directly in front of the lawn mower

and cultivators display.

He told police he watched as the man with a cast put a tiller in the trunk of the car, and the other man closed the

They then drove north to 12 Mile, where the car went

east.

The man went inside the store to ask if anyone had purchased the tiller. Sears employees responded "no", then called the police.

After stopping the men, both from Inkster, authorities searched the vehicle and recovered two cologne sets from Crowley's; numerous cartons of eigarettes, cologne and toys from K mart; a 10" rototiller and tools from Sears; eigars, aftershave, toothpaste and a toothbrush from Arbor Drugs; and a gas treatment package from a local hardware store.

The men, who could face larceny charges, were arrested and the merchandise was confiscated.


