

POLICE AND FIRE CALLS

Listed below are some of the Farmington-area police incidents reported during the past week.

PROPERTY DESTROYED In Farmington Hills The motive behind the break in of Capollas Collision last Thursday was obviously not theft. Nothing was missing. Yet \$1300 in damage was caused to three of the vehicles inside the building.

The suspects entered through a garage door, which also sustained damage, to break out the rear passenger-side windows of a 1987 Ford and 1991 Chevrolet, inflicting \$300 of damage on each vehicle. The third car, a 1990 Ford, sustained \$600 in damages as its dashboard was smashed up.

JEWELS TAKEN In Farmington Hills The son of a Farmington Hills

couple reported the theft of 22 pieces of jewelry in early June. The man told police his father, not able to pay for himself, was getting assistance from home care workers based out of West- lar. The items, including some jade, pearl and amethyst pieces, were removed from the couple's bedroom. The value of the missing jewelry is unknown.

JEEP STOLEN In Farmington Hills Another Jeep Grand Cherokee has been stolen from Bob Saka Olds. This makes four over about one month, but this time there were witnesses. Two teenagers approached the new car manager Thursday to report what they had seen the previous Monday, police said. They described how two white men popped out the driver's side door lock, then fumbled around under the hood. One of the men

got behind the steering wheel as the other jumped in the passenger seat. Then they drove off. After hearing their story, dealership employees checked their inventory and noticed the vehicle missing. The 1993, red Jeep stickered at \$20,000. Both suspects stand about 6 feet tall and have brown hair. The driver has a mustache and wears glasses.

EMBEZZLEMENT In Farmington Hills A 32-year-old West Bloomfield woman was ticketed by local police for embezzling money from her place of business, Detroit Bagel on Orchard Lake. Officers were called the scene by the shop manager after a marked \$20 bill was found in the suspect's purse. She told police it was there because she had made change for herself from the register.

The day started with the owner's daughter giving a friend \$200 to purchase four used bagels, costing \$20. The owner, suspicious of the employee, also instructed his daughter to give \$1 to another friend for a separate purchase. Following both purchases, the manager was instructed to check the register tapes to see if the transactions were there. The \$1 purchase was accounted for, yet the \$20 purchase was not. Officers asked and received permission to search the woman's purse. They found the marked bill. She denied stealing the money.

INDECENT EXPOSURE In Farmington Hills Officers are on the lookout for a man dressed in black fishnet stockings, black lace-up shoes and a green shirt worn over his head. The suspect is accused of fol-

lowing an 18-year-old Farmington Hills and 17-year-old Lake Orion woman from Denny's restaurant on Grand River July 12. When they noticed the man was following them, they walked through the Muirwood Apartment complex trying to locate him before going to a sister's home to spend the night. Inside the apartment, the two teens and the 25-year-old sister saw the man outside on the patio without pants or underwear. He was masturbating. The lessee told the man she was calling police and held the phone up for him to see. After ejaculating on the porch, he walked away from the window heading southbound, police said. The man stands about 5'2", weighs 140 pounds with blonde, collar-length straight hair. He also has a large mole on his right buttock.

UNWANTED VISITOR In Farmington Hills Security officers at Botsford Hospital were required to throw out a 64-year-old man who became loud and disorderly after his insurance carrier refused to cover a certain kind of treatment. Approximately two hours after being evicted, the man returned with a friend, leading security personnel on a foot chase through the surrounding buildings. They finally caught up with after he broke into the North Pavilion by forcing open the electronic doors. He was smoking a cigarette, which he refused to put out. After trying to strike one of three security officers, he was wrestled to the ground and handcuffed, police said. He told officers he intends to press charges.

District ponders best way to sell property

The Walled Lake Consolidated School District wants to sell a 12.2-acre parcel of land near Meadowbrook-12 Mile road, considered not suitable to build a school. And at least two parties want to purchase the so-called "DNR property." But the district isn't bent on simply unloading it, even if Commerce Township officials might want that land to be part of its fledgling neighborhood parks system. The Walled Lake District includes a northwest portion of Farmington Hills. At the school board meeting, one residential developer's bid of \$168,000 was turned down. Meanwhile, resident

Charles Barson went on record stating that, if the property was still available, that he wanted to buy it and possibly build up to 11 large-sized lots on it. "As a selfish resident," Barson said, "our best interests would be (served) if it remained in its undeveloped state. . . . But if it is going to be developed, I want to buy it and I want to develop it." Probably the biggest reason for the board decision not to sell the land, located at the end of Onkside near Gittens Road, right now in the interest being shown by Commerce Township. At least one board

member appeared ready to back the township before supporting a builder. "I'd personally like to see us hold the property," said vice-president Thomas McConnell. "I'd rather see it be sold to Commerce to use as a park than for new homes." However, Commerce Township officials are not ready to make an offer, said schools Superintendent James Geisler, and they probably won't be able to for several months. The school chief said he recently met with Commerce Twp. Supervisor Thomas

Long and with parks and recreation officials to discuss the subject. "I commend them (Commerce officials) on planning," Geisler said after the meeting. "So, if they are about the business of making a parks plan, I think that's the right way to go" rather than go about it hastily. Geisler reiterated what he said during the meeting, that the sale of the parcel isn't an issue that will have serious ramifications. "We're not talking about enough money to make or break our budget," Geisler explained. "The intention is to divest ourselves of it eventually."
