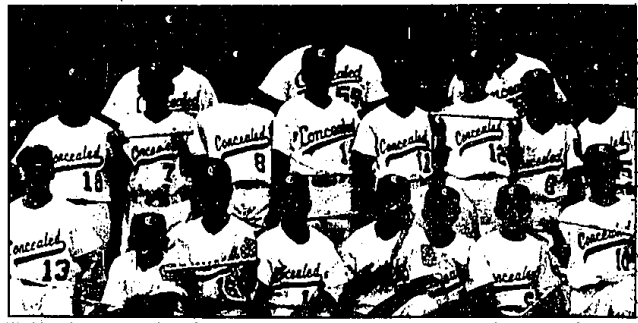
The right-hander from the University of Detroit-Mercy fanned 13 and allowed only three hits in going the distance.

W. Series title eludes Concealed

A World Series championship was about the only title that eluded Concealed Security's Willie Mays baseball team.

The team of 9- and 10-year-

olds concluded a 41-11 season with its appearance in the American Amateur Baseball Congress World Series Aug. 1-4 in Collierville, Tenn.

Concealed Security won its first game, 4-3 over Montebello, Calif., to extend its consecutive winning streak to 19 games.

But the next two games resulted in losses to Puerto Rico (7-4) and Germantown, Tenn., (6-4), forcing Concealed's elimination from the tournament.

In the first game of the World Series, Chris Rigley (Redford) scored two runs on base hits by Mike Monterey (Farmington) and Concealed took a 3-2 lead when Tim Kalczynski (Farmington) singled to score Greg Hocking (Farmington).

In the sixth inning after Monterey drew a two-out walk, stole second and scored the winning run when Dan Kapala (Royal Oak) lined a full-count pitch up the middle.

In California's half of the sixth, Matt Miller singled but was caught stealing when Kalczynski, the catcher, fired at strike to shortstop Monterey covering second.

Jason Krug (Redford), who pitched the final 4 2/3 innings, struck out the final batter to cement the victory.

It was only the second loss in 60 games for Montebello, which battled back to finish as runner-up following a 6-5 loss in the championship game to Houston, Texas.

Concealed rallied from a 7-1 deficit in the sixth inning against Puerto Rico.

After Rigley and Monterey hit safely, Concealed scored three runs on a groundout by Hocking, a single by Chuck Pate (Taylor) and a double by Shaun Murray (Redford).

Concealed had the tying run in the on-deck circle with only one out, but Puerto Rican shortstop Hector DeJesus made two fine defensive plays to end the rally, Pirronello said.

Kyle Miller (Farmington) walked and scored the first Concealed run on a single by Hocking in the first inning.

A three-run second inning gave Concealed a 4-1 lead over Tennessee, but the Volunteers scored three in the fourth and two in the fifth to win.

In the Concealed second, Redford's Brian Dutton and Garden City's Mike Krause and Dominic Noonan made the bases walk, nobody out.

A relief pitcher struck out the next two batters, but Monterey delivered a three-run double to put Concealed on top.

The leading hitters who batted 2-for-3 were Monterey in the first game, Murray in the second, and Kalczynski in the third.

Concealed's roster included Robert Fraser (Detroit), Mark Pirronello (Livonia), Anthony Volpe (Farmington) and Philip Mabey (Livonia).

HOT TOPIC

During the hot summer months, car owners should keep an eye on their dashboard temperature gauges. It is not uncommon for engines to overheat in hot weather, particularly in stop-and-go traffic, when heating a trailer, or when driving grade hills. Overheating can leave vehicles stranded by the side of the road, or can lead to engine damage if not properly attended to. In the event the temperature gauge reads across over into the red area of the scale, it is best to pull over to the side of the road to allow the engine to cool before continuing. If a stop is not possible, an effort can be made to reduce heat buildup by turning the heater to its maximum setting and setting the fan to low speed. The engine compartment should be safe to open. Allow the engine to cool before adding water to avoid subjecting the engine/cylinder head to thermal shock.

When it comes to your car, it's better to be safe than sorry; pull over if your engine is overheating. Turn on fan or let it cool down. At our F.V. NOTICE OF ADOPTION OF ORDINANCE C-630-96. Chapter 19, Nuisance, is amended to add Article 8, Section 19-190 to 194. To prevent false determination of property owners of vacant commercial buildings are required to remove all signage and repair the building as necessary to provide a finished facade. Further, that in vacant commercial buildings all window treatments and displays shall be removed, interior portable air conditioning units shall be removed or treated so as not to be exposed to public view, and furnished signs shall be removed or treated so as not to be exposed to public view. Windows may only be covered with a semitransparent material to obscure view.
