Festival promises Old World flavor

The 70th Original Old World Market sets up shop Oct. 18-20, at the Southfield Civic Center.

Hours are 10 a.m.-8 p.m. Friday and Saturday, 10 a.m.-6 p.m. Sunday.

Ford Motor Company, Detroit Edison Foundation and Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan are sponsoring the event, along with the International Institute of Metropolitan Detroit, Inc.

Following tradition, the Old World Market opens with a swearing-in ceremony of more than 200 newly naturalized United States citizens 19 a.m. Friday, Oct. 18.

International entertainment will also be provided, following another Old World Market tradition.

Headliners include the Ballet Folklorico Anahuc Texcatlpoa, an 18-member professional dance and music troupe making its first U.S. appearance.

The Detroit American Indian Center will be represented in traditional regalia, with the authentic topee that was used in the Michigan Indian Day Parade last month.

More than 40 nationalities are represented on stage and in import and craft booths.

Performers will appear every hour. Old world crafters will demonstrate their art throughout the market, including wood-carving, Chinese calligraphy, Japanese crafts, Ukrainian Pysanky egg decorating, Ukrainian bead work and ceramic painting;

Rumanian, Ukrainian and Hungarian embroidery and Japanese flower arranging and Native American Indian crafts.

International food and pastries will be available throughout the market.

Admission is \$4 for adults, \$3 for senior citizens and children, or \$10 for a family ticket. Advance group tickets for more than 10 adults are available at \$2 per person by calling (313) 871-8600 weekdays during business hours.

Farmington community group spreads its generosity

Farmington Area Community Women have selected the following organizations to each be the recipients of a cash donation of \$1,000.

Nardin Park Braille Transcribers - founded in 1969, is a non-profit organization financially supported by contributions and dues.

This volunteer group offers Braille transcribing and duplicating, soft-cover binding, large print typing and the maintenance of a Braille master repository.

The services are offered free to the visually handicapped and at

a minimal charge for agencies, organizations and other individuals.

Community Living Center - was founded in 1968 by Mary Wagner. Over the past 25 years the CLC program has expanded to include 10 group homes, an apartment training site, senior citizen house, a supported independent living program and an assisted living program.

CLC serves adults with the primary disability of mental retardation ranging from mild to borderline severe. The missions of the center is to provide an enriching environment of oppor-

tunities for adults with developmental disabilities.

Renaissance Home Care - a non profit organization, bringing quality care to children and adults since 1976. RHCC established The Children's Development Fund to deliver essential services to babies and mothers who have no health insurance and nowhere to turn for care.

The Distress Fund provides medical care services to adult patients who either lack health insurance entirely, or lack of insurance coverage for a necessary service.

The Farmington Area Community Women is an organization of local women serving their community through personal com-

mitment. Fund raising events are held throughout the year, including a Mom's Sale on Oct. 5 and Christmas Craft Show on Dec. 7, both
