Internet phone use on the rise

Even now, I remain unconvinced that the Internet Phone will have wide usage in the near future. But I no longer pass it off as just another gimmick.
Remember that one of the most popular features of the Internet is E-mail. And, besides being fun, a strong appeal of E-mail is that messages can be sent anywhere in the U.S. or in the world at no added cost to the sender.

for the Internet Phone.

A free long-distance call can be made anytime of the day at no added cost to the con-

Widespread acceptance may depend, in great part, upon convergence. In many of our communities, cable companies are installing fiber optic lines. Once a user connects to a fiber optic line, speed and quality of voice transmission over the Internet no longer will be a problem.

As cable companies get into the Internet and phone business, Internet telephony should become real popular. Right now, according to estimates from a consulting firm studying telephony, some 20,000 people a week used this technology in 1995.

My interest in this subject perked quite a bit when I picked up a book entitled Internet Telephone Toolkit by Jeff Pulver.

I had read an article a few months ago in the Internet World magazine about Internet Phones and a lot of ink was given to Pulver and his pioneering efforts in this area.

Pulver was one of the early users of Internet telephony software products and has

users of Internet telephony software products and has personally tested every prod-uct that has become available since February 1995. He is a former columnist with Board-watch Magazine. Pulver set up a Listserv dis-

cussion group on Internet telephony and soon was net-working worldwide with persons interested in this func-

tion.

Within a day of the list announcement, more than 125 persons signed up and by June 1996 some 4,000 people were subscribing to the list. He also established a Web site on this new technology, which you can visit at http://www.pulver.com.

Internet telephony has been popular since February 1995 when a small Israeli company, VocalTec Inc., introduced its Internet Phone (IPhone) software.

IPhone continues to be a popular product. Other soft-ware that followed include ware that followed include Cyberphone, DigiPhone and WebPhone in September 1995, WebTalk in October 1995, PGPhone in January 1996, Free World Dial Up in Febru-ary 1996, CoolTalk with Netscape in March 1996.

To use tolephony software, a user needs a PC of at least a 486 with 25 or faster megahertz, at least 8 MB RAM, a sound card, a 28.8 modem, a high-quality microphone, and, of course, an Internet connective.

If you have an Internet connection through the office, however, and your workplace has a security firewall, some of the telephony software may

not work.)

best with Windows 3.1, 3.11,
Win95 or Windows NT. A headset is a useful option, but

One fascinating develop-ment is that it is possible for one person with a computer to talk with via the Internet to another person without a com-

puter.
Pulver has been a leader in
the Free World Dial-Up experiment which makes it possible
for someone on a computer to
talk to someone else on a tele-

talk to someone else on a telephone.

This requires a network of volunteers to make it work.
